**A PROCLAMATION Designating October 10th as Fire Prevention Day**

That America cannot afford to dally with the fire fiend or to relax her vigilance, becomes increasingly apparent as the long list of ruinous conflagrations, frequently attended by loss of life, continues seemingly unchecked.

Despite the fact that we are constantly being urged to exercise precautions for the prevention of fires and the costly experiences which we continue to undergo, a great deal still remains to be accomplished before we shall have attained the goal desired, namely that of doing away with all preventable fires. When we reflect upon the fact that approximately 15,000 persons, most of them women and children, are burned to death in the United States each year, a much larger number are seriously injured, and property amounting to millions of dollars destroyed, it brings forcibly to mind the necessity for constant and never-flagging effort to hold in check this monster of destruction.

Obviously every day should be observed as Fire Prevention Day, but in order that a special effort may be made to impress upon the public mind the urgent necessity of observing all proper precautions to safeguard us from fire, it has been requested by the President that the 10th day of October be set apart for this purpose. It has aptly suggested that there be told in each of our schools on the day named, the Fiftieth Anniversary of the disastrous Chicago fire, the story of that destructive conflagration brought about through man's carelessness.

Now, therefore, I, Thomas E. Campbell, Governor of the State of Arizona, do hereby designate Monday, October 10, 1921, as Fire Prevention Day, and I urge every citizen to take an active part in all measures looking toward the prevention of fires. It is requested that the day be observed by clearing up and abating any accumulations of inflammable material and abolishing of fire hazards where-

ver same may be found. Let the day become one of rigid investigation of all premises with a view to preventing the inception of conflagrations. In this worthy movement our churches can be of great assistance in spreading the doctrine of carefulness from the pulpit and through the Sunday School. The promotion in our schools of systematic instruction in fire prevention should be given special attention on this day, in order that there may come about at frequent intervals a recurrence of public realization to the ever-present peril of fire and the means whereby this calamitous destruction of life and property may be averted.

**RESTORATION TO ENTRY OF LANDS IN NATIONAL FOREST**

Amended List 3-3465

**KANSAS CITY STOCK MARKET**

Largest Cattle Receipts This Year

Hogs Higher; Lambs Steady  
Receipts today were 35,000 cattle and 6000 calves, the largest run thus far this year by about 4000 head. Trading opened slowly on sharply lower bids and later became fairly active, with fed grades steady and steers mostly 15 to 25 cents lower. Hogs were in active demand and 10 to 25 cents above Saturday. Sheep and lamb prices unchanged with a fairly good demand.

Today's Receipts.

Receipts today were 35,000 cattle, 5500 hogs, and 15,000 sheep, compared with 28,000 cattle, 5500 hogs, and 9000 sheep a week ago, and 22,890 cattle, 10,575 hogs, and 13,450 sheep a year ago.

**Beef Cattle**

Only a small percent of the offerings today showed dry feed, and that class ruled steady. Strictly choice grass fat steers and the common kinds were steady, but other classes were 15 to 25 cents lower. There was a fairly large shipping and order demand for medium weight steers and while these orders were being filled there was some activity to the trade. Cows and heifers were mostly 10 to 15 cents lower, and veal calves down 25 to 50 cents.

**Stockers and Feeders**

Selected stockers and feeders were fully steady and the other classes sold slowly, 15 to 25 cents lower. A good many country buyers were here, and more will be here tomorrow as many have been holding back for heavy receipts.

**Hogs**

Hogs were 10 to 15 cents higher, and pigs up to 25 cents. Demand was active and pens were cleared of all offerings before the noon hour. The top price was \$7.90 and bulk of sales \$7.25 to \$7.85. Pigs sold up to \$8.35. Receipts will continue light for another two weeks.

**Sheep and Lambs.**

Trade in both sheep and lambs was active at steady prices. The bulk of the offerings, western lambs sold at \$8.00 to \$8.35, top \$8.40. Average quality was fairly good. Ewes were quoted at \$3.50 to \$4.50. Feeding lambs brought \$6.00 to \$6.75.

**Horses and Mules**

Receipts of horses and mules showed a moderate increase. Demand was a little better. Prices were unchanged as follows: Drafters good to choice 1500 to 1700 pounds, \$100 to \$175, Fair good, \$60 to \$100, Chunks \$50 to \$115, Southerners, \$20 to \$100, plugs \$5 to \$20, Choice heavy mules \$120 to \$140, medium weights \$5 to \$85, 13 1-2 to 14 hand grades, \$25 to \$65.
