### COTTON SEED TAKES

#### JUMP TO \$14 A TON

### EL PASO U. S. JURY

#### INDICTS JIM CASH

Clifton. — On Wednesday of this week Jim Cash, former sheriff of Greenlee County, was indicted by a United States Grand Jury in El Paso, charging him with a violation of the Harrison Narcotic Act.  
Cash was arrested several weeks ago in the Paso del Norte Hotel at El Paso by federal officers when it was alleged he was in the act of making delivery of a large quantity of morphine.

### APACHE TRAIL TO

#### RECEIVE REPAIRS

Clifton. — Indications are increasingly apparent that there is to be a revival of work in the copper fields within less than the prescribed eight months. Jerome, Globe and to a somewhat less extent, Bisbee, are making moves indicative of a revival of mining.

### To Elect Chautauqua Trustees

A meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Ellison-White Lyceum and Chautauqua Association will be held October 20th of this year, at the offices of the Association at Portland, Oregon. This is the first general meeting which has been held by the board since the Ellison-White Bureau placed their business on a strictly non-profit basis, which went into effect February 14, 1921, when articles of incorporation were filed at Salem, Oregon.

Among other matters which will be taken up at this meeting, perhaps that of most interest to the public at large will be the nomination of candidates to run for the office of trustee of the board. The Ellison-White offices at Portland are daily receiving letters from residents of the districts interested, proposing names for the consideration of the board at their October 20th meeting, and it is the desire of the association that anyone having a name to submit may feel free to do so. The two trustees to be elected during the coming year are those representing Districts No. 1 and No. 2, comprising the states of Louisiana, Texas, Arizona, New Mexico and California. Three candidates will be nominated and placed upon the ballot from each district and every Chautauqua, Lyceum and Festival season ticket holder in the territory named will be given an opportunity to cast their vote for their favorite candidate.

"No lights of more than 32 candle power shall be used on any motor vehicle, and all lights in excess of four candle power equipped with reflectors shall be arranged, designed, diffused or deflected, so that a point 75 feet or more ahead of the lamps rise 42 inches above the level surface on which the vehicle stands. All additional or supplemental lights including movable spotlights or searchlights shall comply with the above restrictions and the rays of light from any such searchlight or spotlight shall at no time extend to the left of the center of the highway.

All spotlights used upon motor vehicles and tractors shall be so constructed or arranged that no portion of the top of the beam or light shall rise or shall be capable of being raised by any person occupying any portion of such vehicle, to a point above the level surface upon which the vehicle stands and 100 feet directly ahead of such vehicle, except that when beam of light is swung 30 degrees to the left or right of the straight ahead position no limitation is placed on height to which to which the beam may be raised. No spotlight shall be used on or attached to any vehicle other than a motor vehicle or tractor. Spotlights or lights other than headlights, the direction of which is under the control of any occupant of the vehicle."

### Recruits from All Countries in Marines

While the majority of the Marines are native born, recruits from almost every country in the world enlisted in the corps during the fiscal year ending June 30, 1921, according to an official report compiled by Marine Corps Headquarters, at Washington.  
The total American born numbered 11,735, and of this number New York state contributed 1,096, Pennsylvania 926, Illinois 847 and Ohio 549, the remainder coming from every state of the Union. The alien born recruits, who are required to have either their first or full citizenship papers, numbered 1,126, and represented over fifty foreign nationalities. All the European countries are represented in the report, and there are recruits from Java, Madagascar, Egypt, Syria and from several of the Latin-American republics.

## MANY APPLICATIONS FOR STATE LOANS

Ninety-nine applications for state loans, totalling \$333,312.50, have been made by residents of the fourteen counties, according to a tabulated statement made public by State Treasurer Raymond Earhart.

Maricopa county leads all others both in the number of applications and sums asked, the tabulation shows. Practically one-half of the loan applications come from this county. Coconino, Graham, Greenlee and Santa Cruz counties each have eight applicants.

State funds are now in great demand, applications for loans now being filed at the rate of about \$20,000 a day, Treasurer Earhart said. At present there are practically no funds with which to conclude the applications.

State loans are very attractive because the interest rate is only 6 per cent and loans are made for a period of from five to fifteen years," he said. Loans made for periods of more than five years include provisions that beginning with the sixth year, a portion of the principal with which to retire the loan when

due must be paid each year in addition to the interest. Money used for loan purposes is derived only from the sale of state lands," he concluded.

Loan applications and amounts asked, by counties, follows:  
Apache, one applicant asks \$5,000; Coconino, eight applicants ask \$16,700; Cochise, five applicants ask \$12,900; Gila, three applicants ask \$9,500; Graham, eight applicants ask \$24,300; Greenlee, eight applicants ask \$21,400; Maricopa, forty-two applicants ask \$151,162.50; Mohave, one applicant asks \$1,000; Navajo, two applicants ask \$8000; Pima, three applicants ask \$11,600; Pinal, four applicants, \$20,000; Santa Cruz, eight applicants ask \$31,750; Yavapai, one applicant asks \$1,500, and Yuma five applicants ask \$18,500.
