

THIRTY FOUR CARS FROM THE QUEEN DAILY Great Activity In All Warren District Mines

September 15.—All the operations in the Warren district are going along the same lines as in the past few months. The Copper Queen company continues to ship an average of thirty four car loads of ore daily to the smelter at Douglas, and three cars of supplies to the Old Dominion at Lake, while the Calumet & Arizona take, while the Calumet & Arizona take, while the Calumet & Arizona take...

The new ore handling equipment at the Sacramento shaft of the Copper Queen company is in daily use, but is not yet running as perfectly as could be expected. During the next four weeks it will be working steadily and using all of the ores of the company. At the Junction, of the Superior & Goshute company, two drifts were begun this week from the 1500 foot shaft, which is being cut. No. 1 drift is toward the Hoatson mine and No. 2 is in a southerly direction. No. 2 will be driven directly under the shaft of the Hoatson mine and from this point the shaft will be raised to the 1200 foot level.

The ore bodies in the Junction continue to show increasing richness. No. 1 shaft on the 1300 foot level has a contained vein matter, which is composed of a foot in width to two feet. The ore is a soft sulphide and assays between 6 and 13 per cent copper. The present is being driven in order to test the ore in winze No. 2 on the 1200 level. About 30,000 gallons of water are being raised at the Junction shaft.

The Hoatson's ore body in the Del Norte claim on the 1400 level is proving to be the richest in that mine. The shafts toward the Junction are also showing ore bodies in the Lowell shaft of the Copper Queen Company, which is near the Hoatson.

The Wolverine & Arizona work is being steadily prosecuted in their main winze, which has reached a depth of sixty feet. The formation is a porous, ledge matter and clay. The indications are very favorable for soon reaching the ore body, which has been indicated by the changing formation.

The Lone Star shaft of the Warren Development company has reached a depth of 742 feet. The formation is limestone, with small quantities of manganese and a little iron in it.

FORAKER MAY STUMP ARIZONA FOR CAMERON

PHOENIX, Sept. 17.—The Gazette says: United States Senator Joseph Benson Foraker may stump Arizona for Ralph Cameron this fall. A movement is on foot to bring the great Ohioan to Arizona.

Petitions are being circulated in the various cities of the territory, asking Foraker to come to Arizona and assist the republicans to win over the co-partners of Mark Smith, J. C. Adams, executive member of the territorial central committee for Maricopa county, this morning received a copy of the petition from Chairman Hoyal A. Smith, with a request that he circulate it in Phoenix and the Salt River valley. As there is a pad of paper an inch thick with signatures, Smith evidently expects many signers in this section.

Hoyal Smith is the originator of the idea of bringing Foraker to Arizona and some days ago started a petition circulating in Douglas. It was signed by practically every man approaching democrats and republicans. If the votes of the people of Arizona count for anything, Foraker will come.

In the eastern papers there has been much discussion of a proposal that Senator Foraker stump Kansas for the national ticket. If he comes that far west it is believed there is every probability that he will come on to Arizona.

Foraker coming to Arizona means much to every Arizonan. If he stumps Arizona Cameron will certainly be elected and then statehood is a certainty.

SMALL ORE SHIPMENT FROM JOE DUNN MINE

(From Wednesday's Daily.) Frank Blucher made a small shipment of high grade ore from the Joe Dunn mine yesterday. He has a large tonnage of ore of milling grade exposed in the mine and on the dump. WHO GOT THE APPROPRIATION?

It has been the rule of the federal government for many years to make appropriations for public buildings where it can be shown that the total amount of rentals paid for buildings necessary for the public service will total more than 4 per cent per annum of the amount necessary to erect and maintain such a building. This is the simple reason why Arizona has received a very handsome appropriation for a public building in Phoenix.

It was a knowledge of this fact that caused the inner political circle of Phoenix to secure the location of as many offices of federal appointees as possible in Phoenix. It was this which caused them to secure the consolidation and location of the land offices at Phoenix. It was this which moved them to secure the removal of the surveyor general's office at Phoenix as well as others, because they well knew that as soon as the rentals paid by the government would exceed a certain amount, an appropriation would be made for a public building.

If the public would like to know what influence secured the appropriation for the erection of a federal building at Phoenix, inquire who secured the concentration of the federal offices there. If it was Mark Smith, then what has Prescott and Tucson to say on this subject?—Bisbee Miner.

THE BURNING QUESTION.

What has been accomplished by a democratic congressman from Arizona in twenty years?
