BANK LOOTING RECORD SMASHED

NEW WESTMINSTER, B. C., SEPT. 15.—EARLY THIS MORNING THREE MEN BROKE INTO THE BANK OF MONTREAL HERE, CLIMBING THROUGH AN UNPROTECTED REAR WINDOW, DUG THROUGH THE BRICK WALL INTO THE VAULT, WRECKED THE CAGE DOOR, BLEW OPEN THE SAFE, TOOK \$315,000 AND ESCAPED. ALTHOUGH THE POLICE OF NEW WESTMINSTER TONIGHT PROFESS TO HAVE NO TRACE OF EITHER THE ROBBERS OR MONEY IT IS BELIEVED THE MEN ARE HIDING IN VANCOUVER WHERE THEY FLED IN AN AUTOMOBILE. THE ROBBERS WERE DISCOVERED WHEN THE CHINESE JANITOR OF THE BANK BUILDING, WHOM THE ROBBERS PLUGGED AND BOUND, WORKED FREE AND GAVE THE ALARM. THE JOB WAS ACCOMPLISHED WITHOUT NOISE AND HAS EVERY MARK OF THE WORK OF EXPERTS. THE POLICE ARE CONVINCED THAT THE ROBBERY HAD BEEN PLANNED A LONG TIME BY A GANG OF EASTERN CROOKS WHO CAME ESPECIALLY FOR THE HAUL. THE ROBBERS WERE APPARENTLY POSSESSED OF EVERY DETAIL OF THE INNER WORKINGS OF THE BANK AND IT IS IMPOSSIBLE TO SAY WHEN THEY EFFECTED AN ENTRANCE. THE MEN WERE ALREADY THERE WHEN THE JANITOR ARRIVED. HE WALKED IN ON THEM AS THEY WERE GATHERING UP THE COIN AND BEFORE HE COULD TURN WAS STRUCK DOWN AND TIED TO A POST WHEN HE REGAINED CONSCIOUSNESS.

MOST OF THE MONEY TAKEN WAS IN BILLS OF LARGE DENOMINATIONS AND CONSIDERABLE GOLD BUT NO SILVER. THE SILVER WAS LEFT BEHIND BY THE ROBBERS WHO WERE UNABLE TO CARRY IT AWAY. THERE WAS A PARTICULARLY LARGE AMOUNT OF MONEY IN THE BANK AT THIS TIME OF THE YEAR AS IT IS NEAR THE END OF THE CANNERY SEASON.

USUALLY THERE WAS KEPT A WATCHMAN AT THE BUILDING BUT HE WENT ON A VACATION A WEEK AGO. IT IS APPARENT THAT THE ROBBERS KNEW THIS FROM THE FACT THAT THEY ENTERED THE ROOM WHERE HE USUALLY SLEPT AND TIED THE LOOT UP WITH THE BLANKETS OF HIS BED. IT IS BELIEVED THE ROBBERS ARE STILL IN THIS VICINITY FROM THE FACT THAT A HIGH POWERED CAR STOLEN FROM A LOCAL GARAGE BROKE DOWN AND WAS ABANDONED IN FRONT OF THE Y. M. C. A. BUILDING.

IN THE AMOUNT OF CASH TAKEN THE ROBBERY IS THE BIGGEST IN HISTORY ALTHOUGH OTHER CRIMES NETTED SECURITIES OF GREATER VALUE.
