BOARD OF SUPERVISORS.
 Globe, Gila County, Arizona, October 7th, 1891.
 Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present—Supervisors Shanley, Telbs and Ellison; Chas. T. Martin, Clerk and J. D. McCabe, District Attorney. Minutes of Oct. 6th, 1891, read and approved.
 Upon a reconsideration of the matter of publishing the proceedings of the Board it is on motion ordered that the proceedings of the Board for the remainder of the year be published in full.
 The following claims were then allowed and warrants ordered drawn in payment of the same:
 Claim of J. F. Dalton, repairs \$9; claim of ARIZONA SILVER BELT, printing \$61.89; claim of J. H. Sollers, Deputy Sheriff, Graham County \$10.50; the claim of J. H. Thompson, Sheriff fees, for \$168.30, was on motion not allowed.
 The matter of cutting a door from the Sheriff's office to the jail, was, on motion, referred to the Chairman of the Board and the Sheriff.
 The Chairman of the Board was authorized to sink the wall at the hospital, and when the work is completed to draw warrants on the General Fund in payment.
 The Board then settled the accounts of the County Treasurer, for the quarter ending September 30th, 1891, counted the balance of money on hand and found the same correct.
 The Probate Judge having audited the accounts of Supervisor J. W. Ellison, per diem and mileage, for \$57.40; Supervisor Telbs, per diem and mileage, for \$49.40; Supervisor Shanley per diem, for \$15, the same were ordered paid by warrants drawn on the Salary Fund.
 The claim of Chas. T. Martin, Court Commissioner, for \$16, was on motion rejected, and it was ordered that the same may be submitted to the District Court on an agreed statement of facts.
 On motion the Board adjourned to Nov. 16th, 1891, 10 o'clock A. M.

IMPORTANT MINING DEAL.
 Prof. James Douglas, Miss Douglas and Mr. Ben Williams of Bisbee, arrived in Globe on Sunday last, accompanied by Mr. Philip Oates who met the party in Solomenville. Messrs. Douglas and Williams' chief object in visiting Globe at this time, was for the purpose of examining the Buffalo copper mine, negotiations for the transfer of which to Messrs. Phelps Dodge & Co. of New York, are pending. The party spent the greater part of Monday and Tuesday in an examination of the Buffalo property, and, we are informed, were satisfied with it, so far as they were able to estimate its value. Only two points remain to be determined, namely, a test of the ores (which were thoroughly sampled) and the settlement with the lessees of the property. It is well known that the company which Prof. Douglas represents is desirous of securing a foothold in Globe District and a favorable report from him will determine the action of the company in the matter. In the event of the negotiations being successful, the deal will likely include a number of adjacent claims, belonging to various parties. It is viewed here as the most important mining transaction in the history of Globe District, and great interest is felt for its consummation.

AMONG THE PINES.
 A few days since the Senior of the Belt, for the first time in many months, indulged in an outing and with a view of having an opportunity of realizing the beauties of the landscape seen from an elevation of 6,600 feet above tide water. After a toilsome ascent we found ourselves near the apex of the Pinal mountain in a virgin forest of tall pine where is located Mr. W. Brennan's new saw mill, and although it was Sunday we were greeted by the busy hum of machinery in the full tide of operation of manufacturing boards, mising timbers etc. Knowing Mr. B's religious views in regard to the observance of the first day of the week as a day of rest, we were not a little surprised at its desecration in his immediate presence and with his approval, which prompted us to remind him of the solemn stillness that pervades Globe and all other christian communities on this hallowed day, and finding himself caught in the act, he acknowledged himself a sinner by proxy, and that A. L. Walker of the Old Dominion copper company, was the really guilty person who had urged the necessity of having timber for the mine, in order to protect employes from falling debris, and being satisfied by his explanation that his work was one of necessity we said no more, when he rolled on another log, and the sawyer "let her rip". The mill is new and complete in all its appointments, with its attachments, a planing mill, shingle machine, edgers and turning lathes. The timber surrounding the mill is as plentiful as hair on a dogs back, consisting of sugar-pine, yellow-pine, red-fir, balsam-fir, oak, walnut, ash, and maple. Many of the trees are of gigantic size, containing thousands of feet of lumber. One of which was shown us is entitled to the designation as the monarch of the Pinalis, which measures, at the butt, forty feet in circumference, and which it is claimed will cut twenty thousand feet of lumber.

The road to reach this extensive forest, although it cannot be classed with that built by Appius Claudius Cæcus, while censor of Rome, it, nevertheless, is as perfect a mountain road as could be built. It skirts the mountain side for miles until it reaches the dizzy height of three thousand feet above Globe, from where as you look down upon the surrounding country, a most charming panorama is presented to view, which is well worth the trip to witness. A further ascent of half a mile is necessary in order to reach the top of the mountain, to San Pasco's spolate ranch, where you will find John James, a recluse, with his house, and a well-thumbed polyglot bible. There there you have an uninterrupted view of many, many miles of Arizona spread out before you. More than the eye can distinctly discern. On a clear day, in the far away, through the ethereal blue, more than a hundred miles distant, mountains are seen, and it is claimed that with the aid of a spy-glass you can see into futurity.

CAPT. J. L. BULLIS.
 Among the men who have endeavored themselves to the people of our frontier is Capt. J. L. Bullis, whose marriage to the daughter of Col. John Withers took place last evening. This gallant gentleman was in the saddle for years on our frontier in command of U. S. troops and gained a well deserved reputation for his efficiency and dash as an Indian fighter. The people on the frontier evidenced their appreciation of Captain Bullis by presenting him with a sword. He has always regarded San Antonio as his home, and among our citizens he is held in high esteem for his sterling qualities, and his genial manners. In his second marriage he has shown his attachment of our city by winning one of her fairest daughters. He has gone with his bride to his distant post of duty, in the wilds of Arizona. It is time such a soldier was given a rest within the boundary of civilization; he has won this consideration. — San Antonio Daily Light.
