Mr. Vinson Anderson left Globe this week for Phoenix, where he proposes to make his permanent home. Mrs. Anderson and son will shortly follow. The son, a bright and gentlemanly youth will enter the Territorial Normal School at Tempe.

The committee of arrangements for the St. Patrick's ball will strive to make it a notable event, fully equal to any similar gathering in previous years. A large attendance is all that is needed to insure its complete success. Admission \$1 a couple.

Information has been received by letter that Andrew Scott, formerly night boss in the Globe mine, was severely injured by a cave in a mine at Park City, Utah, and was in consequence in the hospital there. We did not learn the nature or extent of his injuries.

Major Alma R. Chaffee, U. S. A., on detached service, as inspector of office, was "locking into things" a large present week. The report is well and favorably known throughout Arizona as an energetic and eminently entitled to the trust and confidence of his government.

The strike recently made in the fine silver mine has developed into an important discovery of ore, of great richness, assaying from 1,000 to 1,300 ounces in silver per ton. Day and night shifts are being worked, and it is expected that the amount of silver extracted will equal and likely surpass the product of the old previous strike which was about \$40,000.

In the Council, March 3d, Mr. Edwards introduced an act entitled "An act to encourage the construction of railroads within the Territory of Arizona." It provides for exemption from taxation of every kind of all railroads hereafter constructed, upon their franchise, roadbed, rolling stock, etc., for a period of twenty years from March 1st, 1903, and extends the benefits to those railroads the construction of which commenced since March 1st, 1891. The bill was referred to the committee on corporations.

For stealing eleven horses, belonging to Indians at Carlos, Jesus Romero was on Friday brought in by Marshal Paul. Following the loss of the horses the trail was pursued, leading to a horse thieves' camp far up a canyon in the Graham mountains, where the animals were found. The new possessor of them was not taken with, however. His trail was again taken up, and at the end of it Romero was found. He was taken before the United States commissioner at Carlos, held for the grand jury, and word was sent in to the marshal that his man was waiting for him. Lieut. West and eight Indian scouts conducted the capture. -Star.

Mr. Edwards' bill regulating and prohibiting the carrying of concealed, deadly weapons, received the signature of the Governor and is now a law. House bill No. 27, for relieving billiard and pool tables of taxation, passed the House and Council over the Governor's veto.

The Globe postmaster is in receipt of a letter from Jno. Wamamaker, late Postmaster General, acknowledging "the important service rendered as postmaster under the administration of President Harrison." Whatever, he says, has been accomplished in the advancement of the service has only been possible through the fidelity and zeal of those associated with the Postmaster General.

The Prescott Courier says: Good reports come from the Lakawanna mining group, near Payson, where Messrs. Curry & Townsend have exposed extensive bodies of gold ore; have dumps piled high with same, and machinery all ready to work it on the ground, and are now having dug a ditch two miles in length, which will convey a generous stream of water to the camp, sufficient for all purposes.

E. W. Chase, who had been a resident of Globe about two years, died at the county hospital last Wednesday morning of pneumonia, after an illness of two weeks. Deceased was in his 85th year. The funeral took place the same afternoon, and was attended by a few friends who had known the deceased best in life, and learned to appreciate his good qualities. He possessed a well cultured mind and a kindly disposition, and before vicissitudes overtook him had been a man of property and position. He has a brother, E. C. Chase, living at Paradise, Butte County, Cal.

A six story fireproof hotel, in the business center of Saint Louis, belonging to Mrs. Esther A. Nast, nee and cousin of the editors of the Globe Billa, was recently damaged by the explosion of a quantity of shotgun shells, which ignited a keg of wood powder, stored in one of the mercantile establishments on the ground floor. Firms occupying the stores are the heaviest losers. Mrs. Nast was fully insured, and will soon repair all damage sustained. Ten persons were more or less injured by the explosion.

The present week "it rained and it snowed like the devil and blizzard," for which Gila county is duly thankful. The elemental strife has prospectively put millions in the pockets of cattle barons of Arizona and also revived the drooping spirits of agriculturalists. At Brown's mill the snow is reported as measuring three feet and where the Florence road crosses the Pinal mountain the stage driver says, in some places the snow was up to the axles of his vehicle. In lower altitudes the precipitation was in liquid drops. The storm was general, extending north, south, east and west. The Sierra Ancha, sixty miles distant from Globe, plainly in sight, presents a hoary covering of snow, and the presumption is that the storm has traveled north. Apache county has had quantum sufficient of the beautiful snow, and Graham county has not been without its quota and it is probable that no part of Arizona has been eluded.

BOARD OF SUPERVISORS. GILIA COUNTY, ARIZONA, March 6th, 1903. Board met pursuant to adjournment. Present - Supervisors Cook, Tebis and Taylor, and Chas. T. Martin, Clerk, and P. T. Robertson, Dist. Attorney. The report of V. Anderson, the expert employed, was read and on motion ordered placed on file; upon motion the report was unanimously adopted, and it is further ordered that the financial part of the report be entered in the minutes of the Board and be published as part of the proceedings. On motion, overseers for the several road districts of the county were appointed, and their bonds fixed as follows: John Heuck, Overseer of Globe Road District, bonds at \$1000; G. W. Jacobs, Overseer of Grapevine Road District, bonds at \$500; F. H. Powers, Overseer of Tonto Road District, bonds at \$300; S. A. Haight, Jr., Overseer of Rye Road District, bonds at \$300; E. M. Cole, Overseer of Upper Tonto Road District, bonds at \$300; Walker Moore, Overseer of Payson Road District, bonds at \$300; Revilo Fuller, Overseer of Pine Road District, bonds at \$300; Wm. Sidow, Overseer of Pioneer Road District, bonds at \$300; and John Holohan, Overseer of McMillen Road District, bonds at \$300. Petition of J. W. Wentworth, et al to appoint E. F. Fyle, J. P., of Payson Precinct, read and referred back for the necessary number of signatures. The Chairman reported the approval of the bond of B. B. It will be seen by this day's announcement that Gila county's offer of \$500 for ridding the range of the presence of the "Kid" is withdrawn, not because the Board of Supervisors has ceased to realize the necessity of his capture, "alive or dead," but for the reason that Gila and Graham counties were the only two which sufficiently realized the impending peril of Arizona's citizens, while that Indian was alive and at large, to offer a money consideration for his apprehension. Cochise county's Supervisors were personally appealed to by letter, from Gila's Supervisors, to assist in the good work and receiving no response, our Board concluded to ask the legislature to require the Governor of the Territory to offer \$5,000, a sum sufficient to effect the object in view. That being done, each county is compelled to contribute its pro rata for the common welfare of Arizona's citizens.
