**NAVAJO COPPER CO.
IN BONANZA CLASS**

(From Sunday's Daily.)

Former U. S. Attorney J. F. Morrison was an arrival yesterday from the new camp of the Navajo Copper Co., 100 miles north of Flagstaff, and stated shipping of ore had started, in which eight auto trucks of the caterpillar type was the method of transportation. These wagons are necessary owing to the character of the sandy formation and the long distance to be traveled to the loading point on the Santa Fe, east of Flagstaff. The grade of the output runs from 18 per cent to 22 per cent, and engineering reports of the tonnage available give an inexhaustible supply. This copper movement has many well known mining men with it, among them being W. A. Clark, head of the United Verde; Robert Mitchell, of Jerome; several of New York City; J. E. Morrison, of Phoenix, and Robt. E. Morrison, of Prescott. It is the supposition this immense deposit is of blanket formation, the vastness of which has dazzled geologists in arriving even at an approximate tonnage, running into the millions.
