**REWARD COMES TO YOUTH FOR BEING HONEST**

Earl Sands, who started his career as a jockey in Prescott less than two years ago, has finally "gone over the top" in racing circles of the country, being rated now as third on the list of American riders.  
He was accorded this honor at Cincinnati, Ohio, last week, and to reach that distinction his record as published, is one of the most exceptional achievements a person of his age ever accomplished on the American turf. Since leaving Arizona last Autumn this young man, who is entering his 19th year, has won 79 races, and his winnings have totalled over \$125,000. In an interview he stated he "rides for his employers only," and that they are the only ones who know what is going on so far as racing secrets are concerned, wherein he figures, Sands has been "sounded" time and again for a tip and as often has refused to divulge anything he knows. Intimate friends, and in some instances even relatives, have been disappointed by his maintaining the strictest secrecy over racing affairs.  
An admirable trait of character of this youth is that after he had accumulated his first \$20,000 he devoted the greater part of that sum to buying for his father and mother a farm in Utah. Later as his winnings continued he expended a similar sum in buying an adjoining tract of land to that of his parents, making additional expenditures to improve each property. "I want my folks to glide along smoothly through life without want or care, and that is the reason I thought of them first," he stated.  
Sands also says that it pays to be fair and square in or out of the saddle, and this rule he proposes to follow as long as he is on the turf. He is now in New York City to finish up riding for the season, and in all probability will again visit Prescott for a short time.

**SUFFRAGE FAILS AGAIN**  
WASHINGTON, June 27.—Efforts for a vote on the Susan B. Anthony suffrage amendment failed in the senate today after a three hours' debate and preliminary jockeying, with the friends of the measure charging a filibuster. A fight to the finish is promised next week, though some who supported the measure said that the action might be delayed indefinitely.

**MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE**  
HAMMOND, Ind., June 26.—Alonzo Sargent, engineer of the empty train that wrecked the circus train killing 79, and who it is alleged was doing, and Gustav Klaus, the fireman, were indicted today on a charge of involuntary manslaughter.

**MRS. STOREY ARRAIGNED**  
NEW YORK, June 27.—Mrs. William Cumming Storey, former president general of the Daughters of the American Revolution, indicted for alleged illegal war charities activities, was arraigned today in the general sessions court and held under \$1,000 bond for pleading next Tuesday. The prosecutor says that Washington asked for her indictment last December. Mrs. Storey charges that she was arrested as the result of a fight in the society.

**NEW BOND ISSUE**  
WASHINGTON, June 27.—Another bond bill authorizing an \$8,000,000 Liberty Loan, much greater than any heretofore authorized, is being framed by the house ways and means committee. The next issue will probably come in October and subsequent ones when they become necessary.

**TO RELEASE MACHINISTS**  
WASHINGTON, June 27.—The granting of deferred classification to skilled machinists and furloughing those in cantonments is considered necessary to meet the shortage in industries.
