The Board of Supervisors of Santa Cruz County, Arizona.

Office of the Board of Supervisors, Santa Cruz County, Nogales, Ariz., Jan. 3rd., 1922.

The board of supervisors met at 10:00 o'clock a. m., pursuant to adjournment of December 31st, 1921.

Present: Chairman Finley, Members Ashburn and Noon and Clerk.

Minutes of the meetings of December 5th and 31st, were approved.

The following claims were presented to the board, approved and ordered paid out of their various funds:

The following reports were presented to the board, read and ordered filed:

Report of the Clerk of Superior Court for the month of December, 1921.

Report of the County Recorder for the month of December, 1921.

Report of the County Assessor for the month of December, 1921.

Report of the Sheriff for the month of December, 1921.

Report of the County Physician and Supt. of Health for the month of December, 1921.

Report of the Justices of the Peace for precincts Nos. 1, 3, 4, 5, 7 and 13, for the month of December, 1921.

Resignation of I. P. Fraizer, Representative in the State Legislature, was presented to the Board of Supervisors and upon motion duly made and carried, said resignation was accepted, and upon motion of Member Noon, seconded by Member Ashburn, and carried, Mr. A. S. Henderson was appointed to fill the unexpired term of Mr. Fraizer.

Communication from Mr. Richard Farrell with reference to necessary road work on the county road running from Harshaw to San Rafael valley road, was presented to the Board, read, and referred to Member Ashburn, in whose district the work is to be done.

This being the day for advertising for bids on all county printing, county supplies, burial of indigent dead, care of indi-

gent sick, feeding county prisoners, the Clerk was instructed to advertise for bids for the same, said bids to be opened at 2 o'clock p. m., Monday, February 6th., 1922. It was further ordered that all bids be accompanied by a Cashier's check of \$50.00 and a copy of the advertisement, and the Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

Geo. J. White appeared before the Board and asked for an allowance of \$25.00 for the care of a horse for one man employed by the Sheriff, which after due consideration, was duly allowed until further notice from the Board of Supervisors.

Upon motion duly made and carried, the Clerk was instructed to notify all county officials and employees using county cars, that any damages resulting from careless driving, collision, or flood, would be deducted from the salary of the county official or employee who was the cause of said damage.

Upon motion, duly made and carried, the Board recessed until 1.30 p. m. Board met at 1.30 p. m., all Members and Clerk being present.

Upon motion duly made and carried, the Clerk was instructed to authorize the Treasurer to transfer the sum of \$1,400.00 from the County General Fund to the County Salary Fund and the further sum of \$5,700.00 from the County General Fund to the County Expense Fund.

This being the day as required law for the selection of the names of persons for jury duty for the year 1922, the Board now proceeded to make said selection, and the Clerk was instructed to file a copy with the Clerk of the Superior Court as provided by law.

There being no further business, the Board adjourned until Monday, February 6th., 1922, at 10:00 o'clock a. m.

Office of the Board of Supervisors, Santa Cruz County, Nogales, Ariz., Jan. 24th., 1922.

A special meeting of the board of supervisors was called for 8 o'clock, p. m.

Present: Chairman Finley, Members Ashburn and Noon and Clerk.

Mr. Theron Richardson appeared before the Board of Supervisors asking that depository bonds in the amounts of \$10,000.00 and \$15,000.00 be released, the deposits at the present time, not justifying the entire amount of depository bonds now in the Treasurer's office, and upon motion duly made and carried, the Clerk was instructed to notify the Treasurer to release and return to the First National Bank, the bonds released.

A communication from Mr. H. B. Rothrock was presented to the Board and read. Said communication asked that the matter of the fencing and cattle pass on his land be settled, and the Clerk was instructed to inform him that the entire matter had been settled by the State Highway Department.

A communication from Albuquerque, with reference to application for Federal Aid on the Montana Camp Road, was presented to the Board, read and ordered filed.

Communication from the City Clerk with reference to the appointment of an extra man for the purpose of checking up building permits, as per the request of the County Assessor, was presented to the Board and the Clerk instructed to inform said City Clerk that if the City would pay the additional man, the Board would make the appointment.

Communication from Weldon Bailey with reference to damages to the proposed road, petitioned by Wm. Lowe, from the Highway to the Tubac Station, was read and ordered filed.

Communication from Charles W. Gould, informing the Board that the heating system installed in the court house was completed, and ready for inspection, and the report of the County Engineer on same being favorable, it was moved, seconded and carried, that the reports be accepted.

A report was received by the Board that Mrs. Solomon Acevedo, who had been receiving \$30.00 per month from the Board of Supervisors, had a son who was working and receiving \$4.50 per day, so upon motion duly made, seconded and carried, the allowance was reduced to \$15.00 per month to assist in the care of the six minor children. There being no further business, the Board adjourned until Monday, February 6th., 1922, at 10:00 o'clock a. m.
