MINING NEWS.

What is Going on Among the Metal Searchers.

The Last Chance mill near Prescott has started up on custom ore. It will make the first run on ore from the Indiana mine. The mill is now owned by James Samuels.

Charlie Connell and a small party of friends will go out to the Saginaw District today. The Saginaw Mining Co. have recently made such improvement out there in the way of roads, etc., and Charlie wants to keep posted regarding a district in which he is still much interested.—Star.

Jos. Springfield, a mining man operating in Sonora, is a visitor at Tombstone. He is here to look up a copper proposition in the Dragoons. Mr. Springfield thinks Arizona has a wondrous future in mining and believes Cochise county will develop more wonders like the Commonwealth when it is thoroughly prospected. He has traveled considerable over the county and is most favorably impressed with our resources.—Tombstone Prospector.

Mr. C. La Forge, director and general manager of the Boleo copper mines, of Lower California, arrived in Globe on Wednesday, to examine the Continental property for the French bondholders. Mr. La Forge went out to the Continental this morning with Messrs. N. L. Amster and Edmond de Stoutz. The Boleo company is a big enterprise; the mines have been worked for many years and their output of copper is very large. The company is now erecting a magnificent plant to cost 5,000,000 francs.—Globe Silver Belt.

The value of the Yukon gravel is not so very remarkable compared with much that was found in California in early days, says the Mining and Scientific Press. In the Dardanelles mines, in Placer county, a single pan yielded \$1,800. Many others taken out of crevices produced nearly as much in other of the drift mines in the Forest mill divide. But in the shallow placers of early days it was no uncommon thing to find from \$100 to \$500 in a pan. A present resident of Nevada City, Cal., A. Isard, got \$912 from one panful on September 13, 1850. He and his partner that fall took out \$164,000 from a piece of ground thirty feet square in their claim. There are others.

The recent placer strike in the beds of the Yaqui river in Mexico is taking away some of the interest in mining matters from the frozen regions of Alaska. The reports that come from the Yaqui have been verified enough to satisfy a great many and a number of parties have gone into the new country to ascertain the truth for themselves. Rich placer ground has been known in parts of the Yaqui country for many, but the white prospectors have been forbidden to enter the lands of the hostile Yaqui Indians. A recent treaty has been made in which the gold fields there are thrown open to the operations of the whites, and following the announcement of the successful negotiation of the treaty comes the report of a big strike. The Yaqui has many small tributary streams which lead it from different parts of the Sierra Madre mountains and gold has been found in some of these it is reported.—Tombstone Prospector.

SONORA NEWS.

Mining and Other Items from Our Sister State.

Great preparations are being made for the 16th of September celebrations at Hermosillo.

La Trinidad Mining Company in the Sahuaripa district, has suspended operations on account of the low price of silver.

On the 14th of August a sub-port of the Mexican custom house was established at Sasabe, with Ruperto Gatica, as collector.

Monsieur Goulet will be the chief engineer for the Compania de San Pedro de Altar, near Caborea. Mr. Goulet came direct from France last week.

Mr. Simon Bley, one of the prominent merchants of Hermosillo, celebrated his birthday on the 17th instant and had a large number of friends at a banquet.

The Guaymas papers are urging the city council to appoint a food inspector for that town to prevent the sale of adulterated milk, spoiled meat, vegetables, etc.

In Magdalena, Professor Manuel Guerrero, principal of the public school, has in preparation a dramatic performance for the benefit of the public schools of Magdalena.

The body of Jesus Meneses was found last week floating in the bay at Guay-

mas. The authorities cannot determine whether it is a case of suicide of whether foul play has been practiced.

El Estado de Sonora has ceased publication at Nogales and will be established at Minas Prietas in October 1, by S. Montano and Anacleto Ramirez. They will also have a first class job office and will do neat job work at low prices.

LABOR DAY PROCLAMATION.

Territory of Arizona, Executive Department.

The laws of the United States designate the first Monday in September of each year as a legal holiday to be known as Labor Day.

When we reflect that labor day is the foundation and creator of all wealth; that upon it depends all happiness and all excellence; that it is labor that builds up great states and carries on the commerce of the world, the wisdom of this enactment is apparent, and especially is it so when applied to the people of our territory who are laboring to develop its various resources and establish for themselves happy homes. Our busy and industrious communities contain but few drones hence nearly all can be rightfully classed as laborers—the mechanic, the merchant, the miner, the lawyer, the physician, the teacher, the farmer, the divine, the banker and the clerk, as well as he who performs the most severe task of daily manual labor, are laborers in the best sense of the word, for while many earn their daily bread by the sweat of their face and others by the work of their brain, they are all toilers.

A general observance of the day so wisely set apart by congress will tend to promote a higher appreciation of the dignity of labor and the great part it is taking in the building up of our territory, and the great republic of which we hope soon to become a state. To bring labor of all kinds into closer relations with itself and with other interests, to inculcate a friendly feeling and hearty co-operation between labor and capital, thus encouraging good will between all classes of the community with a view to pleasant and reciprocal relations is the great object of this observance of Labor Day.

Now, therefore, I, Myron H. McDord, governor of Arizona, do proclaim and declare Monday, the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, a legal holiday, and do most earnestly recommend that all business of whatever nature, except such as the necessities of the community require to be carried on, be suspended on that day, that all who desire may have an opportunity to observe the day in a manner befitting the importance of the occasion.

Let us not forget that Labor Day is as important and to future generations will become as suggestive and inspiring as the religious and patriotic holidays that our people so loyally and religiously observe.
