## ARIZONA.

### She Should Be Admitted Into the United States.

A careful reading of the newspapers of Arizona discloses that the development of the rich and varied resources of the big territory is proceeding in a most gratifying manner despite the many drawbacks that have existed to development everywhere during the past seven years.

Perhaps this development is most prominent in the mining industry, which is taking great strides forward this year. Arizona is very rich in gold, silver and copper, and it needs only brains and the magic touch of capital to place her in the front rank among the producers of these important metals. A large amount of prospecting is being done and the results seem to be entirely satisfactory to the prospectors, if one may judge from the published interviews.

The cattle industry, too, which has been picking up somewhat all over the country during the past year or two, is no small factor in the industry and prosperity of Arizona, and will add considerably to the roundup of the year's profits.

A new railroad to the Grand canyon of the Colorado will surely be built very soon, if indeed, it is not completed this year. This will add greatly to the attractions of the territory, and will draw many visitors who perhaps now labor under the mistaken impression that Arizona is an almost trackless desert.

The leading cities of the territory, too, are doing very well and displaying unmistakable indications of up-to-date enterprise and push. Phoenix, Tucson, Tombstone, Prescott and others that might be named are feeling the impetus and moving ahead accordingly.

It congress will have the justice to admit Arizona into the Union next winter it will grow and prosper as it never has before, surprising its most sanguine friends. The Herald sincerely hopes that the result will be achieved.—Los Angeles Herald.

## MINING NEWS.

### What is Going on Among the Metal Searchers.

Lew and John Blakely and their wives came up from Cedar, where the Messrs. Blakely have been developing their mining property for some time past. They have located a new find in the Cedar country, assays from which give an average value of over five ounces gold per ton. A six inch streak in the ledge gave a return of \$290. The ledge is over two feet in width. The boys will return to the mine in a few days and sink shaft to a depth of fifty feet as rapidly as possible.—Mohave Miner.

Hon. R. R. Richardson has just leased fifty acres of patented placer ground in the Greaterville mining district to a Chicago company. This company will put in a large new dry process machine which it is claimed will wash fully 100 tons of ground per day. The Greaterville district is in extent and richness one of the best placer fields in the western country, but could never be worked to any extent, owing to the almost entire absence of water.

If the above company have a machine which will do the work, there is no need to look to Alaska for a Klondike, as then Arizona would have one of her own.—Tucson Star.

W. S. Reed came into the city yesterday from Oro Blanco, where he is connected with the Oro Mining Co. The company continues running its mill double shifts, and has more men employed in the mine than ever before. The ore now being mined is of high grade and continuous development shows it to be in large quantity. It is a free milling gold ore and the increased facilities for handling it which are now in progress will, when completed, enable the company to handle a much lower grade of ore at a large profit. Since the present superintendent, S. H. Gould, took charge some months ago, a great deal of development work has been done and extensive additions made to the milling plant, yet cash returns have been made to the owners of the property.—Star.

Act No. 63, of the last legislature provides for the leasing of all school and university lands, and applications are now pouring into the office of the clerk of the board of supervisors. Though the county fathers seem to be in doubt as to the advisability of accepting the provision of the act, as it appears that the territory and not the county receives the benefit therefrom. However, if they do, a great many citizens who have made improvements on school lands will feel much easier in possession.

## LABOR DAY PROCLAMATION.

Territory of Arizona, Executive Department.

The laws of the United States designate the first Monday in September of each year as a legal holiday to be known as Labor Day.

When we reflect that labor day is the foundation and creator of all wealth; that upon it depends all happiness and all excellence; that it is labor that builds up great states and carries on the commerce of the world, the wisdom of this enactment is apparent, and especially is it so when applied to the people of our territory who are laboring to develop its various resources and establish for themselves happy homes. Our busy and industrious communities contain but few drones hence nearly all can be rightfully classed as laborers—the mechanic, the merchant, the miner, the lawyer, the physician, the teacher, the farmer, the divine, the banker and the clerk, as well as he who performs the most severe task of daily manual labor, are laborers in the best sense of the word, for while many earn their daily bread by the sweat of their face and others by the work of their brain, they are all toilers.

A general observance of the day so wisely set apart by congress will tend to promote a higher appreciation of the dignity of labor and the great part it is taking in the building up of our territory, and the great republic of which we hope soon to become a state. To bring labor of all kinds into closer relations with itself and with other interests, to inculcate a friendly feeling and hearty co-operation between labor and capital, thus encouraging good will between all classes of the community with a view to pleasant and reciprocal relations is the great object of this observance of Labor Day.

Now, therefore, I, Myron H. McDord, governor of Arizona, do proclaim and declare Monday, the sixth day of September, one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, a legal holiday, and do most earnestly recommend that all business of whatever nature, except such as the necessities of the community require to be carried on, be suspended on that day, that all who desire may have an opportunity to observe the day in a manner befitting the importance of the occasion.

Let us not forget that Labor Day is as important and to future generations will become as suggestive and inspiring as the religious and patriotic holidays that our people so loyally and religiously observe.

## RAILROAD NEWS.

### What is Going on Along the Line of Travel.

Gen. Epes Randolph went to Yuma Saturday in his private car on business.

The Southern Pacific is making many improvements on the N. M. & A. and Sonora railroads.

H. S. Foreman has accepted a position as engineer on the Torres Minas Prietas railroad.

Francisco Velasco is acting agent at Torres for Wells-Fargo, during the absence of H. King in California.

There is a new switch engine in the Nogales yards, or at least the old one so well overhauled that it is not recognized.

W. G. Gillet, assistant chief engineer of the Southern Pacific R. R. is personally superintending the work of the reconstruction department in changing the track near Dragoon Summit and Railroad Pass. Three miles of the new grade near Railroad Pass is now ready for the tracklayers.—Tucson Star.

Benson as a town is neither more nor less of a town than it was some years ago. It hasn't grown, neither has it decreased materially in population. Benson is however conspicuous as a shipping point. Merchandise for Bisbee, and all points along the N. M. & A. road not only in Arizona but the whole state of Sonora draw their American supplies through this point. As an evidence of this the freight receipts of the Southern Pacific aggregate, it is said, about \$4,000 daily or \$120,000 per month. The Southern Pacific, the Arizona & Southwestern, and the New Mexico & Arizona railroads all converge at this point and it is one of the most important points in the country.
