

COUNTY COMMITTEE IN WORKING TRIM

Republicans Select P. H. Hayes and Celora M. Stoddard to Manage Campaign

The newly elected members of the republican county central committee met yesterday afternoon at headquarters in the Fleming block and organized by the selection of P. H. Hayes for county chairman and Celora M. Stoddard for secretary.

That was the primary business of the day but it was followed by a general discussion of the situation and a conference as to plans for conducting the campaign. There was a good attendance at the meeting, from the outside precincts as well from the four Phoenix wards and the enthusiasm with which prevailed indicated a confidence on the part of those who are to have charge of the battle, that should inspire candidates to effective and winning work.

The selection of the new committee officers is regarded as a fine start toward victory. Mr. Hayes though narrowly defeated in the recent primary, has lost no zeal in party success. He is young and energetic and has demonstrated his efficiency even in his own losing campaign. A comparatively new man in the county precincts which he had no opportunity to visit, and with little organized work, he made a splendid showing. Mr. Stoddard, the new secretary is one of the younger men of the city, is active and ambitious and is endowed with an energy that should aid materially in the success of the ticket.

CITY HAD FAILED.

Agua Prieta, through neglect of some of its officials, will have to stand for the loss of five thousand dollars Mexican money. The treasurer of the municipality was not under bond when he made his escape. In spite of a most diligent search, the officers are still in the dark as to the present whereabouts of Antonio Herrera, the official accused of absconding without leaving notice of his destination and with five thousand pesos

of the city funds in his pockets.

Local officers consider it most probable that he is now in El Paso, as his relatives reside there. Prior to leaving, Herrera is said to have visited a local bank, where he purchased a draft for 300 pesos to be sent to his sister. At the time he made this purchase he exhibited a large amount of currency, it is stated by persons who saw him in the bank.

To Mexican officials who know that he had a large sum of money in his possession, he is said to have exhibited the roll of bills, stating that he was on his way to the bank. He even told several of them goodbye, saying that he was called to Cananea on business.

ILLUMINATING PISTOLS.

During the recent extended maneuvers of the German army there

were many night attacks, in which use was made of the newly introduced illuminating pistols. According to the new regulations, these are to be employed wherever the configuration of the land makes their use preferable to that of the ordinary searchlight.

The machinery necessary for the use of the latter device is very inconvenient, and especially in rolling and otherwise difficult country, where the main maneuver takes place, it cannot be used to advantage. The illuminating pistols have not this disadvantage, as they are easily transported. Further, the searchlight is useless in valleys and deep lying plains, as their rays shoot over these and leave them apparently in still deeper shadow. For this reason such valleys serve as excellent covers at night against the searchlights. The illuminating pistols have done away with this advantage of shelter as the cartridges which they throw light up the deepest and darkest gulleys.

There are two different sorts of cartridges, producing respectively white and red light. The white ones serve exclusively for illuminating the country, the red ones for signaling purposes between widely separated

commands or divisions, even where the distance between them is several kilometers. The illuminating cartridges develop a light that makes everything within 200 meters (656 feet) visible, and lasts eight to ten seconds.—Scientific American.

THE ANGUISHED OTTOMANS.

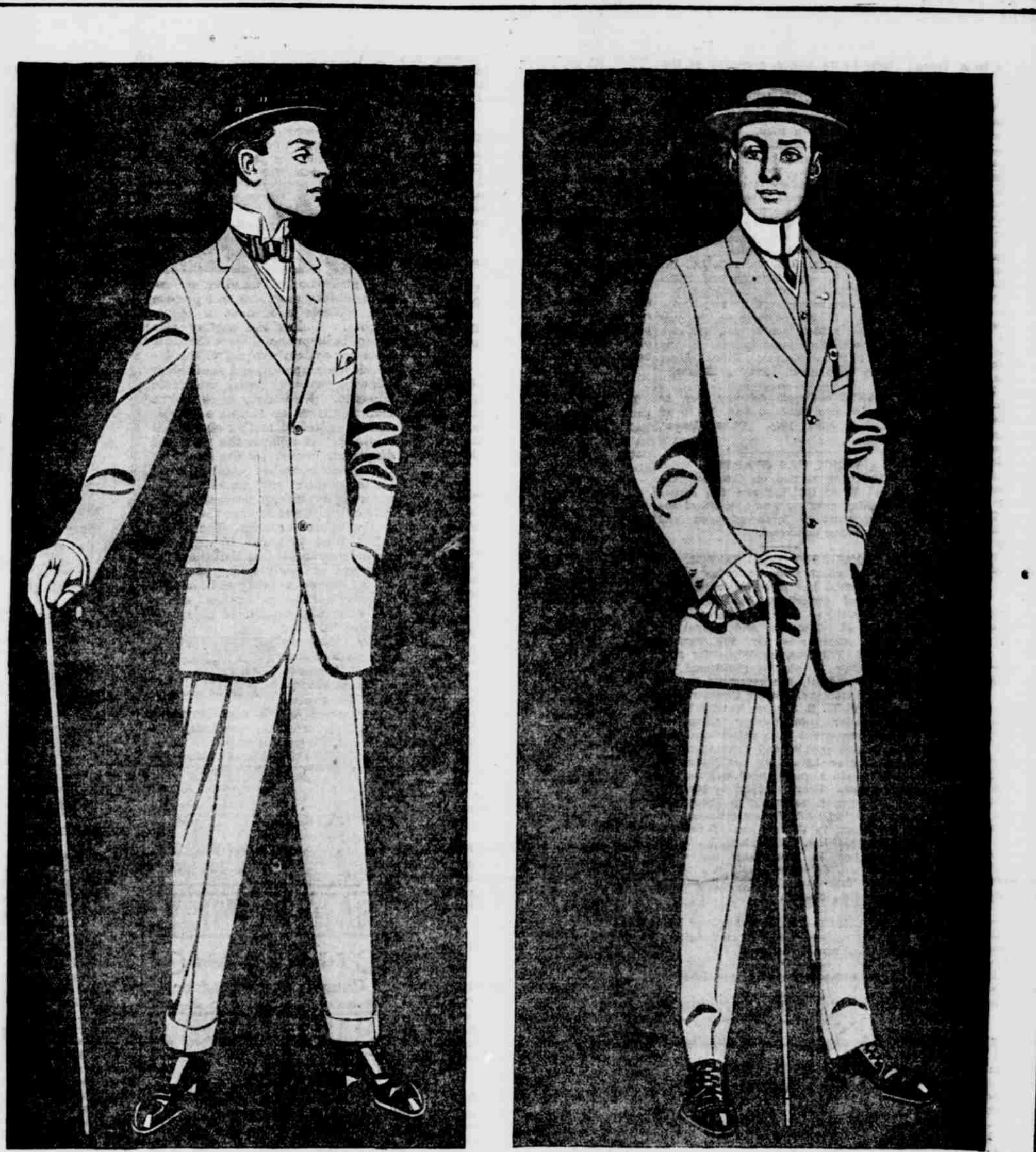
