The Mexican National Railway. The first passenger train to Monterey, Mexico, on the 21st of August. The road is now completed from Corpus Christi, Texas, to that point, a distance of 333 miles. Monterey is one of the business centres of Mexico and has a population of about 40,000. It is connected by rail with Laredo. Regular trains will be run as soon as the track is laid out. Between the 26th of August and the 1st of September, a little over three miles of rails were laid each day by the construction party. The company have now 233 miles finished in Mexico and Texas and claim they will have 600 miles in October. Monterey is about 500 miles from Maricopa, which point it is promised the track will reach from the City of Mexico next month. It is stated that over 900 miles have been subscribed for. Here, too, as in the Mexican Central great commercial and industrial results may ultimately ensue. Meanwhile, however, the cost of contract will be a loss to the 40,000 shareholders subscribing.—Miner Review.

Yellow Fever. WASHINGTON, Sept. 28.—The total cases of yellow fever at Brownsville thus far are 1,870; deaths 130. The cases at Pensacola 244; deaths 41. Several new cases are reported and one death.

Salt Lagoons are met with in several places in Apache county, Arizona. The principal lake or lagoon is near the base of New Mexico. About 1,000,000 pounds are taken yearly from this lake, and with proper facilities it could be made to produce an almost unlimited supply.

The salt is precipitated to the bottom of the lake, wagns are driven into the shallow water, and the glistening crystals shoveled in. This is one of the most valuable salt springs on the continent, and besides supplying cattle raisers in Apache and portions of Yavapai, furnishes large quantities for the working of silver ores.—Citizen.

The commanding officer of company C, Indian scouts, will proceed to San Carlos, A. T., and there discharge, on the 30th instant, his company of scouts and turn over the discharged Indians to the Indian Agent, San Carlos Indian Reservation, and immediately thereafter call to a new company of twenty-five Indians.

Upon the completion of his duty he will return without delay, with his company, to his station, Fort Huachuca.

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RAILROADS.

We are glad to see the *Gazette* take up the subject of the railroad question.
