Mr. W. M. James, of the firm of Lightbody & James, El Paso, Texas, paid Clifton a business visit the past week.

C. Layton, of Safford, has returned home, after a four months trip to Mexico on business connected with his colony.  
A. M. Franklin and Mrs. J. B. Collins, of Maxey, were among the arrivals registered at the United States on Monday.

Mr. and Mrs. J. T. Fitzgerald, and Master Johnnie, came up from Lordsburg last Saturday and remained over Sunday in Clifton.  
Mrs. Reardon, late teacher of the Safford public school, and her charming daughter, Miss Frankie, removed to Tombstone on Saturday last.

Capt. N. S. Davis, having severed his connection with the Arizona Copper Company, took his departure for California yesterday morning.  
M. M. Rice, the well-known newspaper correspondent, and H. Arnolds, representing Lillenthal & Co., San Francisco, are stopping at the Clifton hotel.

Charles W. Green, editor and proprietor of the Deming Tribune, one of the best papers in New Mexico, is visiting Clifton in the interest of his paper.  
Sheriff Crawford started from Solomonville last Thursday for Yuma with six prisoners convicted at the late term of court and sentenced to the Territorial prison.

The Pima Lumber Company's mill in the Graham Mountains is running on full time at present, the company finding a ready sale for the product in the Gila valley towns.  
M. E. Cunningham, foreman of Hampson's ranch, on Eagle creek, arrived in Clifton last week ill. He left for Albuquerque yesterday morning to remain until he has recovered his health.

A wing is being added to Clifton's hall, in Pima, on the south side of the building. An amateur dramatic performance was given in the hall last Saturday evening, which was a decided success.

Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Olds, of San Francisco, are guests at the United States Hotel. Mr. Olds visits Clifton in the interest of Hubert Howe Bancroft's historical works of the Pacific States of America, to assist in collecting historical data, and also to secure subscribers to the same, and we trust that the objects of his visit will soon be realized to his entire satisfaction.

There is at present great activity all along the Gila valley farming district, preparatory to the harvesting of crops. The crops, both wheat and barley, have not looked so promising for many seasons past as they now do. While the high water has caused great damage to the different irrigating canals, still all are now in good order, and water for irrigating purposes is abundant.

Sheriff Crawford received from Governor Tittle on the 9th inst. a requisition on the Governor of New Mexico for Frank Tarbell, who was recently arrested by the authorities in Albuquerque. Deputy Sheriff Randall left last Thursday to secure his man, but upon arriving at Albuquerque found that Tarbell had been turned loose. At last accounts Randall was diligently hunting his man, with fair prospects of capturing him.

That Clifton, Morenci and Duncan in connection with Lordsburg are to have the benefits of religious services is now a settled fact. The Rev. Mr. Sumner, of Las Vegas, writes to the CLARION that a clergyman will shortly arrive from the East to assume charge of the somewhat scattered but very promising field. The gentleman will be orthodox and Protestant, and the CLARION trusts, may we be confident, that the citizens of the various towns will exert themselves to aid the cause, both by regular attendance upon the services, and by contributing liberally of their worldly goods, for a clergyman, in order to perform his duties well, must receive not only moral but financial support.

Monday evening, upon receipt of intelligence of the Indian outbreak, no time was lost in the towns in this portion of both Territories in conveying the news to the different ranches and isolated mining camps. From Clifton, Duncan, Carlisle, in fact, in all of the towns, citizens mounted swift-footed steeds and sped away in the darkness, and during the night the inmates of many newly-made homes were aroused by the clatter of horse's hoofs and a friendly halloo, and then the story was told in a few words, "the Apaches are on the war-path," and before they could fully realize the terrible truth the brave rider and his gallant steed again rode on, to warn others beyond. Well may each and every pioneer in the Southwest ask the question, How much longer are the red devils to be cared for during the winter season, fattened and pampered, to prey upon defenceless settlers as soon as the grass is fit for food in the spring?

**The Indian War.**  
Capt. Pierce, 1st inf., with Al Sieber, chief, and 22 Indian scouts, arrived in Morenci this (Wednesday) noon. The Captain reports having come direct from San Carlos agency, via Eagle creek. He cut no fresh trails, which shows that Geronimo and his bucks, who must be south of Clifton ere now, have taken no southward route through this county to reach Mexico.

**TERRITORIAL ITEMS.**  
Albuquerque's population foots up only about 1,800.  
The assessment roll of Nogales amounts to \$100,000.  
The Tucson Citizen reports Quijota camp as looking up.  
Lake Valley, N. M., is reported very dull, the mines there having closed down.  
Bishop Bourgarde, the new Roman Catholic prelate of Arizona, is a native of France.  
The Prescott Miner says Gov. Tittle has suffered a relapse, and is again confined to his bed.  
The Southern Utah and Northern Arizona Stock Association has sent twelve cattle thieves to the pen.  
An attempt was made to assassinate Lieutenant Mason, 4th cavalry, at Fort Lowell, on the night of May 10th.

It is reported that the Old Dominion Copper Copany, of Globe, has been reorganized and will start up again.  
It is feared that none but Chinamen need apply for work on the proposed railroad from near Maricopa to Phoenix.  
Agents of a Scotch syndicate talk of purchasing 1,000,000 acres of land from the Atlantic & Pacific Railroad Company.  
Sergeant G. J. Jackey, E company, 1st infantry, was assassinated in Whipple Barracks, Prescott, on the night of May 15th.  
More silver claims will be worked this season in Globe district than ever before since the camp started. So says the Silver Belt.  
F. M. Murphy, Arizona's Commissioner to the New Orleans Exposition, is expected to arrive at his home in Prescott about the 25th.

Theodore F. White, who was recently appointed cattle quarantine inspector for Southern Arizona, has declined the appointment.  
W. A. Vincent, of Las Vegas, formerly of Illinois, has been appointed Chief Justice of New Mexico, in place of Axtell, removed.  
Dr. McSwegan, of Tombstone, was last week held by Justice Alvord to await the action of the Grand Jury on a charge of abortion.  
The Tucson Citizen is authority for the statement that in one of the shafts at Deer Creek coal fields a seven-foot vein of splendid coal has been cut.

Tombstone's assessment shows \$634,680 in real estate and \$90,000 in personal property, a falling off from last year of nearly half a million dollars.  
The monthly bullion output of the Copper Queen Company, of Bisbee, has recently decreased, according to the Tombstone papers. No reason is assigned.  
The Rio Grande Republican says that the land office at Las Cruces, N. M., did more business last month than in any four months in the previous history of the office.

The contract for building the east wing of the New Mexico capitol building in Santa Fe was let last week to Denver parties for \$155,000. Work will be commenced at once.  
The new Montezuma Hotel, at the Las Vegas, N. M., hot springs, is one of the finest buildings of the kind in the United States, and will prove a popular resort beyond all question.  
The sentence of Frederick J. Glover, convicted of murder and sentenced to be hung for the brutal murder of his mistress at Prescott, has been commuted to imprisonment for life.

S. Lindauer, of Deming, received the contract for furnishing the San Carlos Indian agency with beef for the ensuing year at \$2.84 per cwt. The amount called for in the contract is 2,500,000 pounds.  
The first reported arrest and conviction under the new obscene language law comes from Flagstaff. The culprit gave vent to a blue streak of oaths in the presence of ladies, and was fined \$10 and costs.  
Thirty applicants for the Governor's chair of New Mexico are in awful suspense awaiting the appointment of some one of the number to the coveted position. The CLARION is of the opinion that James Mullen, of Silver City, will be the lucky man.

A number of teams that have been employed freighting between here and Globe have pulled out for other points. Their return may be expected soon, however, if there be truth in the report that the Old Dominion Company has been reorganized.—Willcox Stockman.  
A Solomonville correspondent writes the CLARION that the announcement that Pablo Garcia had been pardoned was received at that place with much pleasure, not alone by the immediate friends of Garcia, but by officials and others who, knowing the facts upon which application for executive clemency was based, believe that it should have been granted.

**GERONIMO'S BAND**

**Of Chiricahua and Their Chief Leave the Reservation—Their Destination Believed to be the Sierra Madre.**  
Shortly before 6 o'clock p. m. on Monday last two telegrams were received in Clifton which caused a decided sensation. The tenor of both was to the same effect. The first was dated Fort Apache and was signed Wade, Lieutenant-Colonel, the second was from Fort Thomas and was signed Mills, Major Commanding. The contents of both were the same—fifty Chiricahua bucks under Geronimo had left the reservation on the 17th, and had taken the Eagle Creek trail. Each stated their destination to be Mexico, and added that troops were in pursuit.

At the time of writing (Tuesday evening) nothing further in regard to the outbreak has come to hand, but it is unreasonable to suppose that the savages have not committed depredations, and that the white men they may have encountered have not fallen victims to their savage and murdering propensities.  
The Chiricahua number not more than 530 all told, bucks, women and children, and the number of warriors who have left the reservation is stated to be but fifty. But the amount of deviltry this number can commit is almost impossible to conceive.  
The Chiricahua for the past year have been kept in the immediate vicinity of Fort Apache, under the watchful eye of Lieut. Gatewood. There have been no complaints made by them, and they were apparently satisfied with the treatment they received.  
Fort Apache is distant by trail from Clifton ninety miles, and it is more than probable that by this time (Wednesday morning) the Indians are nearly as far south as the Southern Pacific Railroad.

**Mining Notes.**  
The hoisting machinery and engine will be in place this week at the Detroit.  
A great deal of lagging has been brought to the Longfellow recently from the vicinity of the Coronado mine.  
The Alaska continues to look well. On the second level last Saturday they struck a fine body of 30 per cent ore.  
The copper ore in the Morning Star is a high grade black oxide. Parker & Whalen are getting out the same to sell to the Arizona Copper Company.  
Numerous ore platforms are being constructed on the line of the Coronado Railway, on which ore will be deposited by pack trains from the King and other mines.  
The claim "7.30," recently opened near the Queen, that native copper was struck in last week, continues to produce the same. It belongs to the Arizona Copper Company, and was opened in the bed of Chase creek.  
Brown & Cole, the lessees who are working the El Paso, in the face of the 100 foot tunnel, have struck the body of ore which was uncovered on the surface 80 feet above. The ore is black oxide, carrying a strong trace of gold.

Mathison & Morris have completed their contract of building a wagon road to the White Hawk mine from the Metcalf, three-quarters of a mile in length, and are now hauling ore to the head of the incline. They have a contract to deliver 2,500 tons. The White Hawk belongs to the Arizona Copper Company. The ore is quarried, not mined, and is of an exceedingly good grade.  
Mr. Wm. Bonnell has struck gold-bearing rock of the same quality as that found in the Morning Star on a claim recently located by him in the same vicinity, and distant from it 3,000 feet. What work he has done to date has developed a vein of free milling gold ore the width of the shaft. The formation is hornblende quartzose, and the property is a most promising prospect. The shaft which he is sinking is now down twelve feet.  
Messrs. Guthrie, McDermott and Dinneen deserve to realize handsomely on their property in this district, and it is but a question of time when they will be enabled to do so. By their individual efforts they have driven over 1,400 feet of tunnel on their mines, as follows: Alaska, 450 feet; Tip-Top, 150 feet; Frisco, 450 feet; Delta, 50 feet; Limestone, 75 feet; King, 80 feet; El Paso, 200 feet. They have at present eleven men in their employ.

Last Friday afternoon, while the Mexican population of the Pueblo Viejo valley were celebrating the feast of San Isidro at the head of the San Jose ditch, Epitacio Perria was shot in the back by Juan Trejillo and instantly killed. They were in a wagon together with several others, who were firing pistols in honor of the occasion, and it is claimed that the fatal shot was entirely accidental, while some think otherwise. Justice Fournes, who was present, caused the arrest of Trejillo, and charged him, before Justice Frazee, with murder. The examination of the case commenced Saturday, and was concluded Sunday, District Attorney Dolan appearing for the Territory and Judge Goodwin for the defendant. At the suggestion of the District Attorney, the defendant was held for manslaughter, and his bail set at \$500.
