SAN FRANCISCO has been enjoying a temporary boom in mining stocks. Anything in the shape of mining stocks has been boomed to the fullest extent.

FINANCIAL and Mining Journal of Nov. 27 says: The Lake mining companies have not yet completed the pool sale that has been under negotiation, and the market has ruled quiet but firm at 12 to 12 1/4 cents cash.

TERRITORIAL NOTES.

Holbrook is to have a new Masonic hall in the near future. The cowboys still continue to make things lively in Holbrook.

Five hundred men are now at work on the Prescott & Arizona Central railroad.

The treasurer of Yavapai county received \$8,045, of taxes during the month of November.

St Johns wants a telegraph line built connecting that place at Navajo with the outer world.

Hon. Sumner Howard has consented to be a candidate for Mayor of Prescott, at the coming city election.

The Prescott papers tell of delayed mails. Stages days behind time, and of rain, snow and mud hub deep.

The society of Arizona Pioneers, of Tucson, are preparing for an interesting annual celebration on the 29 inst.

The people of Globe are rejoicing over the prospects of the early completion of the Narrow Gauge railroad to that point.

The prisoners in the Yuma penitentiary were given a splendid dinner Thanksgiving day by Superintendent Thomas Gates.

The Florence public schools have an average daily attendance of three hundred pupils. Three teachers only are employed.

General Royal A. Johnson is a candidate for Mayor of Tucson. The papers of that city endorse his candidacy enthusiastically.

The fall calf crop on the Tonto and Salt river ranges is reported unusually light this season. No reason is given for the falling off.

California is taking kindly to Arizona beef, a half a dozen or more California butchers have representatives buying cattle in this territory.

Wilson Douglas, who killed Clement Lindstrom, at Tombstone in August last, has been sentenced to imprisonment in the Yuma penitentiary for life.

Charles Cohn, who killed his partner Chas. Spencer last week near Hackberry, will be tried by the U. S. Court as the killing was done on an Indian reservation.

A syndicate of eastern capitalists recently purchased of the Atlantic and Pacific railroad a million acres of land. They propose to stock their purchase with Texas cattle.

The Indian school at Fort Yuma has a regular attendance of seventy five children. They are fed and clothed by the government. The school is under the charge of the sisters of St Joseph.

Arizona mountains are full of mineral of silver, copper and gold, her mesa lands are rich in nutritious grasses, and the valley lands fat with vitality and anxious to be converted into grain, fruit and vegetables.

E. S. Stover, of St Johns met with a painful accident recently. While returning from a hunting trip his gun was accidentally discharged shattering his left arm in such a manner that amputation was necessary.

William Hall, the first prisoner confined in the Yuma penitentiary and who was pardoned two years ago, was sent back to that institution last month from Pinal county under a two years sentence for stealing cattle.

Sheriff Hatch, of Cochise county delivered three prisoners to the penitentiary last week Pantaleon Frajillo for grand larceny goes for one year, John Jackson horse stealing two years, and Wilson Douglas, murder for life.

Francisco Ortiz a milkman, living two miles this side of Nogales was robbed recently of \$1,500 by masked bandits. They tied their victim with ropes and by beating and threats made him confess where his treasure was hidden.

The El Fronterizo of Tucson says: "We have information from reliable sources that the smallpox is rapidly spreading in Nogales, and it is not impossible for this city to be invaded if the necessary precautions are not taken in time. Children ought to be vaccinated, and no time should be lost."

Last week at Nogales, Charley Anderson, a negro, had words in a saloon with Billy Long, who was a guide and scout with Capt. Lawton throughout the campaign. Anderson, who was drunk, left the place, procured a shot gun and when he returned to the saloon Long drew a pistol and shot Anderson three times, mortally wounding him.

Phoenix had another visit from the fire fiend on the night of December 1st, destroying Sweeney's meat market; L. A. Mariposa's grocery, Mantano's family liquor store and Wright & Harlock's bakery. The building belonged to Mrs. DeForest Porter and were insured for \$2200. Dr. Thibodeo's drug store adjoining the burnt buildings suffered to the extent of \$1000 by water and rough handling and is fully covered by insurance. The origin of the fire is a mystery.
