As the Democratic National Convention is to be held on June 5th it behooves our Territorial Central Committee to be moving in the matter of holding a convention for the purpose of selecting delegates to represent us at that convention. It is true it is somewhat early to make this suggestion, but such things had better not be left until the last moment. The following gentlemen comprise the Democratic Territorial Central Committee:

Apache—J. L. Hubbell, Harris Baldwin, Cochise—L. W. Blinn, J. H. Tevis, James Coyle, Gila—W. A. Helms, W. A. Griffin, Graham—Geo. H. Stevens, B. F. Norton, Maricopa—B. Goodrich, A. L. Henshaw, H. H. McNeill, Mohave—A. Cornwall, Caldwell Wright, Pima—T. J. Jeffords, S. M. Franklin, B. C. Parker, Pinal—G. H. Oury, P. R. Brady, Yuma—M. J. Nugent, J. J. Stein, Yavapai—Morris Goldwater, J. C. Herndon, J. G. Campbell, Hon. P. J. Bolan is the chairman and Chas. Driscoll secretary of the committee.

The last territorial convention directed that the delegates to the national convention be chosen by a territorial convention to be called for that purpose, the delegates to such convention to be chosen by the counties respectively. Therefore it is only fair to presume that the delegates to the convention will be apportioned to the different counties on the basis of the vote cast for Marcus A. Smith, Democratic candidate for delegate to Congress at the last general elections. The vote of each county will be of interest, which was as follows:

Yavapai—Democratic 1194, Republican 938. Pinal—Dem. 460, Rep. 389. Mohave—Dem. 224, Rep. 292. Pima—Dem. 836, Rep. 728. Maricopa—Dem. 862, Rep. 677. Graham—Dem. 578, Rep. 266. Gila—Dem. 298, Rep. 216. Cochise—Dem. 1298, Rep. 512. Apache—Dem. 585, Rep. 325. Yuma—Dem. 169, Rep. 138.

Acting upon the presumption that the apportionment of delegates will be based upon the vote cast for the head of the ticket, and that the basis will be one delegate for every 100 votes and fraction exceeding 50, the representation would be as follows: Yavapai 12, Pinal 4, Mohave 2, Pima 9, Maricopa 9, Graham 6, Gila 3, Cochise 12, Apache 6, Yuma 2, total 65.

A report has been circulated throughout the territory the past week that a band of eight Indians, supposed to be from the San Carlos reservation, had fired upon J. C. Jones of Aravaipa, who had been hit but not injured by a spent ball. Troops from Forts Grant, Lowell and Hualacua were immediately started in pursuit of the hostile party, but up to the time of going to press no further particulars had reached us. It has been reported that the authorities at San Carlos claim that there are no Indians from the reservation missing, and upon this report a theory is based that the party who fired upon Mr. Jones is the same which has been deprecatory in Mexico, being a remnant of Geronimo's band that escaped capture. This seems hardly probable, however, and a theory to our mind more probable, providing there is a band out, is that it is a small party of bucks dissatisfied with the action taken by the authorities at San Carlos in relation to the recent killing, when considerable feeling was manifested by a portion of the Apaches because Captain Pierce would not deliver up to them the murderer. Still another theory, and perhaps the most probable, is that a mistake has been made and there are no Indians out at all.

Last Wednesday night, about 8 o'clock the Southern Pacific train No. 29 was held up at Steins pass by two men, who climbed on to the engine and compelled the engineer to stop the train and un couple the mail and express cars from the passenger coaches. After taking the mail and express cars about a mile and a half down the track, they were stopped and the express car robbed, no resistance being offered. The mail car was

not molested. After robbing the express, the robbers, who were afoot, departed, going in a southerly direction. A posse, consisting of Marshal Meade, Deputy Will Smith, Len Harris, Sheriff Shaw of Pima, and others, started in pursuit immediately on receipt of the news.

A recent Phenix dispatch says: "Two deeds just recorded in the county recorder's office here would indicate that the redoubtable James Addison Peralta Reavis of land grabbing notoriety has disposed of his claim. The first is a deed of usufruct from Dona Sofia Loreta Kiso Peralta-Reavis to the Cordova Improvement Co., granting them certain exclusive privileges upon the Peralta grant. The second deed conveys to Clinton P. Farrell, of New York, all of the Peralta grant with the exception of fifty thousand acres more or less heretofore deeded to other parties and corporations and twenty thousand acres lying about the mines of Casa Grande and just to the first mentioned deed. The consideration in each deed is five dollars which no doubt expresses the value of all the rights of James Addison and Dona Sofia in the property conveyed.

In the New Jersey senate a bill has been introduced providing that the death penalty shall hereafter be inflicted by electricity. The act provides that in sentencing criminals the judge shall name the week during which the execution shall take place, and within the week so designated the sheriff of the county shall select the day, not previously to be made known to any one except the persons allowed to be present at executions. These shall be the sentencing judge, prosecuting attorney, two physicians, twelve reputable citizens, two clergymen (if requested) and seven assistant sheriffs. The corpse subsequently must be buried with enough quicklime to consume it or to be given up for dissection purposes. Newspapers are prohibited from reporting the execution further than the bare mention of the event.

St. Louis has been chosen as the place for holding the next Democratic National convention, which will assemble on June 5th.
