Items of Interest Gleaned From Exchanges.

Flagstaff and Williams will celebrate July Fourth.

Geo. W. Mauk, an old resident of Arizona, died at Phoenix last Wednesday, June 18th.

It is reported that the Mormons will establish a branch of their church at Clifton.

A meeting of the Arizona Wool Growers' Association, general division, will be held at Flagstaff July 10th.

Thirteen carloads of sheep were shipped from the stock yards at Flagstaff Sunday, by Caampbell & Francis, to Kansas City.

The next meeting of the grand lodge of Knights of Pythias will be held in Yuma. Make the date along about February, please.

T. C. Job, of Prescott, and E. S. Clark, of Flagstaff, have formed a law co-partnership and will have their office at Prescott.

Sam Webb, Jr., son of the president of the Democrat Publishing Company, Phoenix, was married last Sunday to Miss May Gordon.

The earliest of the watermelon crop is being marketed at Yuma, says the Sun, but no very large ones have yet been brought to town, the small ones commanding good prices, however.

Acting Governor Stoddard last Monday granted a pardon to Fred A. Guimond, who was serving a 15-month sentence for embezzlement, having been sent up from Jerome last December.

The Williams and Winslow ball teams played at Winslow Sunday and the former were defeated by a score of 24 to 8. Our Winslow boys will down everything on the line this season, if we are not badly mistaken.

Surveyor-General Hugh H. Price will soon let a contract for surveying 250,000 acres of land in the northern part of Arizona. The cost of this work will aggregate \$50,000. The land is principally timber land and is quite valuable.

President E. P. Ripley has decided not to await congressional action, and the proposed new hotel to be constructed by the Santa Fe railway company at the Grand Canyon will be rushed to an early completion. The site for the new house will be 300 feet in the rear of the present hotel.

Prof. C. W. Crouse, Indian agent at Whiteriver, who has been in the city for several days,

returned home Monday. He is located 85 miles from the railroad and says the trip is not one that a person would make any oftener than the most urgent business required. Judge Crouse says that the government is making a sanitarium out of the post for the recuperation of returning soldiers from the Philippines, and for those soldiers whose physical condition does not warrant their discharge from the service. There are two batteries of artillery and two troops of cavalry stationed at the fort at the present time, but they are expecting orders to start for the Philippines. They will be replaced in a few weeks with four companies of infantry now on the way here from the islands. It is claimed that Fort Apache is one of the most healthful places in the state for invalid soldiers, and as soon as the soldiers are sent there from the islands are in possession of their strength they will be replaced by others returning from the far east.—Gazette.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

OF THE
Edna May Mining Company.

The undersigned, citizens of the United States, do hereby voluntarily associate themselves together for the purpose of forming a corporation under the laws of the territory of Arizona, and do adopt, execute and acknowledge the following as the Articles of Incorporation of such corporation:

And we do hereby certify:

The name of the corporation shall be THE EDNA MAY MINING COMPANY.
And its principal place of transacting business shall be in the town of Winslow, Navajo county, Arizona territory, and such branch offices as may be designated by the board of directors of the company, hereinafter provided for.

The names of the incorporators of this corporation are J. X. Woods, Julius Lesser, E. A. Sawyer and W. D. Britton.

The general nature of the business proposed to be transacted by this corporation is mining, milling, smelting and reduction; the buying, selling, leasing, bonding and working of mines, ore and bullion; the building of roads, tramways and railroads; to acquire by purchase or otherwise and to dispose of the same, stock of other corporations, real estate, mill-sites, and water rights and work or otherwise develop the same; erect the necessary buildings, mills, machinery and appliances and purchase material for the same; to mine for gold, silver, copper lead and other minerals, and to sell, mill, reduce, smelt, refine or otherwise prepare the same for market; to handle and control inventions and letter patent relating and incident to mining, milling and smelting of ores; to conduct and carry on a general merchandise business, ho row money, issue bonds, and mortgage, pledge or otherwise dispose of all of its corporate property for the security or payment of any of its indebtedness, and to do any and all things and acquire all property, real and personal, which may be convenient and necessary to carry into effect the objects for which this corporation is formed, and said capital stock may be used for the purpose of purchasing property for the company.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be one million (\$1,000,000) dollars, divided into one million (1,000,000) shares of the value of one (\$1.) dollar per share; and the same shall be fully paid and non-assessable.

The capital stock of this corporation shall be issued and paid for upon the conditions and at the times as hereinafter provided for by resolution of the board of directors of this company, and the stock of other corporations may be exchanged for mines and other property at such prices and upon such terms as the board of directors may determine.

The time of the commencement of this corporation shall be the day upon which these articles are filed in the office of the secretary of the territory of Arizona, and said corporation shall terminate twenty-five (25) years thereafter.

The government of this corporation is vested in a board of directors consisting of not less than seven (7) nor more than eleven (11) members, all of whom shall be stockholders of the corporation, who shall be elected at the annual stockholders' meeting and shall hold office for one (1) year from the date

of their election and qualification, and until their successors are elected and qualified. Any vacancy in said board shall be filled by the remaining members thereof. And such board of directors shall have power to hold any meeting and transact any business for the company at any time or place within or without the territory of Arizona, and all the acts of such board shall be valid, provided that a majority of all members of the board shall be present and vote in favor of such act or acts, and such vote shall be complete evidence of the sufficiency of notice for the meeting; and said board of directors shall have the power to establish by-laws and make all rules and regulations necessary for the management of the affairs of this corporation, not inconsistent with the constitution and laws of the United States and the laws of the territory of Arizona.

The following named persons shall constitute the board of directors of this corporation until the first annual meeting of stockholders and until their successors are duly elected and qualified, to-wit: J. X. Woods, Julius Lesser, E. A. Sawyer, W. D. Britton, F. W. Nelson, R. R. McDonald and Edw. Enos. The number of directors to be elected at the annual stockholders meeting, not less than seven nor more than eleven, shall be stated in the call for said annual meeting, to serve for the next ensuing year, which said number shall be fixed by resolution of the board of directors at their meeting next prior to the issuance of such notice to the stockholders.

The officers of this corporation shall be a president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer, and such other officers as the board of directors may deem necessary for the purpose of transacting its business; provided, that the president or vice-president may also hold the office of treasurer; such officers to be elected by the board of directors; and the following named persons shall be the officers of this corporation until the first annual meeting of the stockholders hereof and until their successors are duly elected and qualified, to-wit, president, J. X. Woods; vice-president and treasurer, Julius Lesser; secretary, W. D. Britton. Provided, that none of the officers of this corporation except directors, president, vice-president, secretary and treasurer are required to be stockholders of the corporation.

The time for holding the annual meeting of the stockholders of this corporation is fixed for the first Monday in the month of December of this year.

The highest amount of indebtedness or liability, either direct or contingent, to which this corporation is at any time to subject itself is Five Hundred Thousand (\$500,000) Dollars.

The private property of the stockholders of this corporation shall be exempt from any and all liabilities for the payment of corporate debts.
