OIL TERMS AND WHAT THEY MEAN

EROSION— Wind, the action of water through ages of time, the bergs of the glacial period and various other similar causes have, in places, worn down the outer layers of the earth, leaving portions of deep lying strata exposed. Tops of anticlines are eaten down and synclines are sometimes superficially filled up, but the exposed strata shown after the inroads of erosion are a great help to the geologist.

OIL RESERVOIR OR OIL POOL— These are not vast underground caverns filled with lakes of oil as they are usually pictured in the mind of those inexperienced in oil geology. They are simply portions of strata whose body is made up of sand of varying degrees of coarseness, dolomite lime or other rock of porous nature. The oil fills all these minute spaces between the grains of sand or the tiny cavities in the rock and when these are thoroughly filled the sand is in what is known as a state of saturation.

WHY IS OIL FOUND IN HIGH SPOTS ON ANTICLINES INSTEAD OF AT THE LOWEST IN SYNCLINES— Oil is sometime found in a synclines but the reason for its more usual location at the top of folds, closure, domes, etc. is in response to a simple chemical law. Pour oil on water, even mix it thoroughly with water, and still in a short space of time the oil, because of its specific gravity, will rise to the top of the water. In the underlying sand, lime, or rock strata the water seeks the lowest level, oil naturally rises to the top of the water so is found in the highest parts of the curving strata. Gas being lighter and more volatile than either water or oil, rises above the oil and is often apparent first.

HOW WAS OIL FORMED— There are three well defined theories.

First—It is of inorganic or chemical origin. Some scientists say that it may have been made by the action of hot water on calcium aluminum, iron and other carbides. This is a theory supported by chemists but NOT by many geologists. Others who believe in its inorganic origin claim that it was made from limestone, gypsum and water under heat and pressure. Still others claim it to be the result of volcanic gas escaping far below the earth's crust and condensed by pressure. As a laboratory theory this is plausible but does not carry much weight with a practical field geologist as there are so many things it does not explain.

Second—the organic theory or the belief that oil originated from the decomposing animal or vegetable remains of ancient ages. The animal theorist claims that it is produced from the decay of ancient sea animals such as fish, oysters, scallops mollusks and coral and still others by a most minute sea animal called foraminifera. Their bodies form beds a hundred feet in thickness altho each tiny individual is only visible under a microscope.

The vegetable theory has many different sides. Some claim that the oil was distilled from vast fields of kelp that floated in the ancient oceans, others say that it comes from rank swamp plants from the land, others from very tiny sea plants called diatoms and still others that it was exuded by coal under heat and pressure.
