News of Importance From all Parts of the World.

And Condensed Into Fact Without Comments.

MArch 5.
In New York to-day silver was quoted at 96 1/2, lead, \$4.40; and copper, \$14.35

—A poll of the Missouri house of representatives on preferences for presidential candidates, resulted: Cleveland 35; Palmer 10; Boise 7; Gray 1. Eleven were non committal and eleven were against Cleveland. The republicans were unanimous for Blaine.

—The President has approved and signed the land court bill and it has now become a law. The appointment of officers under the provisions of the bill will be made as speedily as possible and an early adjudication of land titles of states and territories affected will follow.

—It is stated that in accordance with arrangements made before Senator Hearst's death, the horses of the Hearst stables will fill all engagements. The colts in California will be shipped east and at the end of the season will be sold.

—There is an interesting coincidence to be noted in the case of the bill which passed yesterday for the erection of a mint in Philadelphia. President Harrison will sign the bill tomorrow which is the 100th anniversary of the day on which President Washington signed the bill establishing a mint at Philadelphia.

—The President has signed the direct tax bill, the act to prevent book-making and pool selling in the District of Columbia, the act to establish circuit courts of appeal and to define and regulate in certain cases the jurisdiction of the courts of the United States.

—During the first week in February three men held up a train at Alila, California, and in a fight which followed the fireman of the train was killed. Two of the train robbers are now in custody. One is in jail at Tulare and the other has been arrested by the Sheriff of San Luis Obispo county. It is said both are positively identified. The third man is believed to be wounded and in the city receiving medical treatment. Detectives are watching for him closely.

The Tucson Star says: "A poor Papago Indian, who had brought a deer strapped on the back of a poor pony from near the Quijotes, about eighty miles, was up in Judge Slater's court yesterday on a charge of violating the game law, which provides against the killing of any elk, deer, antelope, mountain sheep or goat between the 1st day of February and the 1st day of October. The Indian plead ignorance of the law, and after a lecture from the court, through Judge Walker, who was the interpreter, poor Lo was dismissed with an admonition that a repetition of the offense would certainly cause an infliction of the penalty."

LAST DAYS OF POMPOSIT

Give Way to "John Brown's Body" and "Good-bye, My Lover."

WASHINGTON, March 4.—The House of Representatives of the Fifty-first Congress went out in a burst of song to-day. Its ending was remarkable and unprecedented, and a scene similar to that which followed the declaration of the Speaker that the Fifty-first Congress was adjourned, without day it was safe to say never occurred before in the Congress of the United States.

The vocalists of the House on the Republican side of the chamber gathered in a body near the front row of desks, headed by Mr. Coleman of Louisiana, Mr. Yardley of Pennsylvania, Mr. Stivers, of New York and Mr. Wade of Missouri, and as soon as the House was declared adjourned they started up the stirring war tune "Marching Through Georgia," which was taken up by the great mass of the Republican Representatives, who made the hall ring, to the great delight and admiration of the thronged galleries. A Democratic chorus headed by Representative elect John J. O'Neal, of Missouri, started with the "Doxology," but their voices were soon drowned in the superior volume of sound from the Press gallery of the House, where the representatives had taken up the hymn, Republicans and Democrats alike ceased their singing, to listen to that of their sometimes critics, whose resonant chorus was very effective. Messrs. Burrows and Allen, of Michigan, and Coleman, with Mr. Yardley for prospector, struck up "Our Fatherland" as the closing notes of the Doxology died away, and the Republicans joining in it very generally the effect was fine, as was the singing of "John Brown's Body," which was taken up immediately. The occupants of the Press gallery, for the last numbers in the programme, rendered "Good-bye, Congress; Good-bye, My Lover," and "He is a Jolly Good Fellow," and it was with regret on the part of the immense throng on the floor and in the galleries that the impromptu musicale came to an end.

Speaker Reed addressed the house. In the course of his speech he said, "I am confident that the highest recommendation that can be given us in the future is not for the laws we have passed, valuable as they are, but because we have taken so long a stride in the direction of responsible government and having demonstrated to the people that those who have been elected to do their will can do it. Henceforth excuses will not be taken for performances. The government by the people will be stronger in the land. Toward those who have opposed what the majority of the house desired we can have no unkindly or personal feeling. To members on my left with whom I am politically associated I beg to tender my most sincere and heartfelt acknowledgment. No man ever received more ungrudging and unflinching support from a band more patriotic." The speaker then declared the house adjourned without day.

The unfriended item was then taken up of the French spoliation claims and an amendment agreed to, also to all remaining points in dispute. McKinley offered a resolution of thanks for Speaker Reed's performance of the important duties of the chair. In his closing speech the vice president referred to the death of three

members of the Senate during its session. He thanked the senators for their courtesy and kindness manifested toward him as presiding officer and declared the senate adjourned without day. In the house the bill was passed to incorporate a national conservatory of music of America. All the regular annual appropriation bills received the president's signature.

SUFFERING YUMA.

The Worst Not Told and Not Known Yet.

Additional news from Yuma gives a graphic account of the terrible results of the late storm. The latest news is published in the Globe Democrat of last Monday morning and the telegraphic account is dated Yuma, March 1st.

The river above town is seven miles wide and below the town in places the water covers the country in one grand lake over fifty miles across. The railroad company will not have the blockade raised for westbound trains for four days, and it will be ten days or two weeks before they can get east. The town has provisions sufficient for eight more days, and the Southern Pacific hotel is feeding a thousand people a day. Reports from Yakuno, fifteen miles above, are to the effect that the flood drove the people into the tree tops, and many becoming exhausted from cold and hunger dropped into the water and were drowned.

Twenty-five hundred Cocopal Indians occupy the river banks for 80 miles below Yuma, and there is no news direct from them. The ex-chief says hundreds are lost. They live in the lower valley along the river bottom and when warned would not flee to the hills. Word is expected to-night from them. They have corn and beans but no meat. Their houses will stand six to eight feet of water, but it is over ten feet all over the reservation. They are expert swimmers and will live in the water for days, and without food. There will be no trains either way from Yuma for at least ten days yet.
