 day for the return of all members

 duty. This applies to several hundred
 men who have been at home on in-
 definite leave of absence and is said to
 be due to the fact that over 200 of

 company now being formed in Denver
 for service in Cuba. A recruiting
 office has been open here for the past
 three days and about 600 names have
 been enrolled.

 Significance.

C. S. WILL NOT INTERFERE

Officials Will Not Regard Her
 Visit of any Official
 Interest.

AS PRIVATE CITIZENS.

WASHINGTON.—In the event of
 Queen Liliuokalani and princess
 Kaiulani coming to Washington
 their visit could not be regarded by
 the authorities here as official for the
 United States has formally recognized
 the Republic of Hawaii and its diplo-
 matic representatives receive full
 official credit here. The last friction
 was removed when Minister Thurston
 retired on request of Mr. Gresham.
 The ex-queen and princess could not
 therefore be treated other than as private
 citizens.

33 BILLS TO BE CONSIDERED

A Murderer to be Shot in Salt Lake City on the 15th.

CLOSE OF A FAMOUS CASE

BOISE.—The supreme court today handed down an opinion in which it is held that the equal suffrage amendment, voted on at the recent election, was adopted and hereafter women will vote in this state.

WASHINGTON.—At the night session of the House thirty-three bills were favorably acted upon. There were no new features of the session.

SALT LAKE CITY.—At Randolph, Utah, Judge Hart today sentenced Patrick Coblan to be shot on December 15, for the killing of Officer Dawes and Stage last year.

LEAVENWORTH.—At the close of the argument in the Santa Fe case Judge Myers announced that he would file a written opinion in the state district court on Dec. 28.

FINANCE NOTES.

The cane sugar product of Louisiana amounts to 300,000,000 pounds, entitling the planters to \$11,000,000 bounty. This bounty trade from the South Atlantic ports has at last been accomplished by the presence of a passenger steamship loading at Port Royal, S. C., for Liverpool.

A receiver has been appointed at Lawrence, Kan., for the J. B. Watkins Land Mortgage company. The total liabilities are said to be \$1,550,000, and the assets \$9,250,000.

The director of the mint has prepared a report, showing that the total gold product of the United States in 1895 was 1,739,081 ounces, valued at \$2,500,000, an increase for the year of 24,000 ounces.

The Iron Age reports total capacity of pig iron furnaces in blast April 1, at 150,732 tons, against 139,100 tons on March 1, 99,242 tons on February 1, and as compared with 178,808 tons on April 1, 1895.

The annual report of the Standard Oil company, of New York, filed with the secretary of state, shows: Assets, \$2,100,000; debts, \$14,100,000; capital stock, \$7,000,000, all of which has been actually paid in.
