The sales of American securities have been, according to London advices, very large abroad of late. If this state of things holds, there will be an increasing influx of British gold into this market. They do not favor the project of converting it into a branch insane asylum, but prefer that it be used for educational purposes for a normal school, or instance.

The branch asylum does not strike anybody as a good business move, for it would cost about \$15,000 a year more for the care of the insane than it does now. The present facilities are ample. At least 200 patients could be cared for. There are only 150 there now, G. zette.
