The case of Halner vs. Wilson was on trial before Justice Easton yesterday afternoon. All the witnesses were examined, testimony taken and the case taken under advisement.

**Was Geo. Foy Acquitted.**  
The case of the City vs. Miss Geo. Foy occupied the entire attention of Judge Hawke yesterday afternoon. A jury of twelve was summoned and sat throughout the trial in grave deliberation. Although our Chinese population is not large, yet enough witnesses and spectators of the tribe of Confucius were present to take possession of a South Sea Island. The testimony was direct and diametrically opposite. Witnesses whose veracity has never before been questioned unqualifiedly swore one way, and the representatives of the six companies swore just as hard the other way. The Court indulged very frequently in copious draughts of ice water and looked as though he would like nothing better than to be at the North pole, or some other equally desirable spot, where police courts are unknown and where mankind is at peace with all the world unless he happens to possess a mirror. The attorneys for both sides were positive of each other's total depravity and masterful arguments were made that surprised the roof of the building. When the case was given to the jury that august body decided that the fair plaintiff was innocent of any wrongdoing and she was discharged. The case attracted considerable attention and was a test case of the city ordinance. It might be a good idea for the City Fathers to pass an ordinance that would not admit of debate on cases of a similar nature.
