**OFFICIAL REPORT.**

The Transactions of the Board of Supervisors of Cochise County.

TOMBSTONE, August 3, 1889.

Board met pursuant to adjournment at 10 a. m.

Present—B. S. Coffman, chairman; T. J. White and John Montgomery, members.

Minutes of previous meeting read and approved.

The Treasurer was ordered to transfer from the General Fund to the Salary Fund, the sum of \$782.21.

Unanimously voted that the Board examine all the county bridges on the San Pedro river.

Unanimously voted that the County of Cochise through this Board in accordance with Title 65, Revised Statutes of Arizona will pay rewards for scalps of wild animals taken up to August 30, 1889, as follows, and none others:

Panther or mountain lion \$ 12 00  
Bear 6 00  
Timber Wolf 2 00

Ordered that the County Treasurer is hereby authorized and directed to procure one hundred lithographed bonds of the denomination of one thousand dollars each, in conformity with Title 31, Chapter 2, Revised Statutes of Arizona, approved March 2d, 1887.

**Attempted Rape.**

In Justice Meyers court there was another case of attempted rape on a little 12-year old Mexican girl named Isabela. The mother testified that the girl was playing with some other children in the yard, when she missed her and went out and called. The child answered from an old stage cover that was sitting on the ground near by. She went to it and raising the curtain saw her child and Pedro Reales, a man about 50 years of age. The man's action plainly indicated that he had been attempting a foul deed. The little girl was taken away and in answer to questions, said that Reales had taken her into the stage cover and threatened to whip her if she cried out. Luckily the mother came to her rescue before any harm was done. The trial attracted a large crowd. He will be held for the grand jury.—Tucson Citizen.

**July Weather.**

Mr. Chas. W. Pugh, the weather clerk, has kindly furnished us the following weather summary for the month of July just passed: Mean temperature, 80.50 deg.; highest temperature, 106 deg. on 2d; lowest, 56 deg. on 1st—making a monthly range of 50 deg. The greatest daily range was 49 deg. on the 2d; the least, 14 deg. on the 7th. The prevailing direction of wind during the month was west. Total rainfall, 4.91 inches, precipitation occurring on twelve days. The rainfall for the month was extraordinary, being over an inch more than the fall of any preceding July since the Signal office was established here, and more than twice the July average.—Wilcox Stockman.

**Reward Proclamation**

EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT,  
TERRITORY OF ARIZONA,  
OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR.

Whereas, I am informed by M. F. Shaw, Sheriff, that Louis Cohen was murdered in the county of Pima at or near Nogales, this Territory; and

Whereas, I am further informed that said murder was committed by one Manuel Verdugo, and that said Verdugo has been duly indicted by a grand jury of said county of Pima; and

Whereas, Said Manuel Verdugo is still at large and a fugitive from justice,

Now, therefore, I, Lewis Wolfley, Governor of Arizona, by virtue of the authority within me vested, do offer and proclaim a reward in the sum of Three Hundred (\$300) Dollars to be paid by the Territory of Arizona for the arrest and conviction of the said Manuel Verdugo.

In witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and caused the Great Seal of the Territory to be affixed.  
Done at Phenix, the capital, this first day of August, A. D. 1889.
