OFFICIAL REPORT.

The Transactions of the Board of Supervisors of Cochise County.

TOMBSTONE, September 4, 1889. Board met pursuant to adjournment at 10 a. m. Present—B. S. Coffman, chairman, John Montgomery, member. Minutes of previous meeting read and approved. Ordered that the Treasurer be instructed to cancel the assessment to E. F. Hubbard, on house and lot in St. David's in 1887, as it was assessed to M. H. Merrill and taxes paid, also to cancel the assessment on horses, wagon and harness, as they were removed from the Territory in 1886. Ordered that the assessment for 1888 to Jacob Hoersch on sec. 10, township 17 south, range 20 east, be cancelled; also the assessment to Peter Church for 1888, on sec. 10, township 17 south, range 20 east, be cancelled, as all of said land is included in the townsite of Benson, and is assessed to other parties; also that the assessment to C. M. Hooper in 1888, on the E½ of NW¼ and W¼ of NE¼, sec. 7, township 16 south, range 20 east, be cancelled, as said land was assessed to Antonia Grijalva. Ordered that T. Allison be employed as assistant to Clerk of the Board of Supervisors in making out the duplicate tax roll. Ordered that there be entered on the duplicate assessment roll for the year 1889, in the column headed Collectors' Fee, an amount equal to two per cent of the taxes due from each tax payer, based on four dollars and one-fourth of one cent on each one hundred dollars valuation of his property. Ordered that the taxes of R. S. Hatch for 1887, be settled, and the deed to the Territory be cancelled on his payment to the County Treasurer the sum of twenty dollars. Ordered that the taxes of M. M. Welch for 1887, be settled, and the deed to the Territory be cancelled on his paying to the County Treasurer the sum of ten dollars. The following claims were allowed and warrants ordered drawn: Bank of Tombstone, jury cert. \$ 14 00 C. H. & T. Co., supplies county. 6 75 H. G. Howe, making map for Senate committee. 137 00 S. Tribolet, supplies county. 23 35 Board adjourned to meet at 1 p. m. September 5, 1889. **B. S. COFFMAN,** Chairman. **FRED CASTLE,** Clerk. Phil Sullivan arrived in Tombstone Tuesday night from Guatemala, Central America. He says that country is improving and considerable mining is being done. The most important work now being done in that country is the building of a railway by private individuals. About 500 Mexicans are at work on the road. Mr. Sullivan will return to that a country in a few months.

THE GENUINE OPINION.

DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE, WASHINGTON, July 16, 1889. To the Honorable, the Secretary of the Interior:

SIR:—I have examined with care the letter of Governor Wolfley, of Arizona, dated June 26th, and the letter of the Secretary of Arizona Territory, Mr. N. O. Murphy, dated June 2d, both of which seem to have been referred by you to Assistant Attorney-General Shields, and have been by him brought to me for consideration and an opinion. I am unable to find in either, any question of law which is not covered by the opinions of this Department, rendered to you under dates of March 16th, May 29th and June 19th, 1889. The first of these opinions was to the effect that, under the Act of Congress, which is the Organic law of the Territory, the session of the Legislature of Arizona is limited to SIXTY consecutive days. The corollary of this conclusion seems clear that any attempted legislation after that time would be nugatory. The second opinion was to the effect that under the Organic law of Arizona Territory the Governor has no power to call an extra session of the Legislature. And the third opinion was to the effect that THE LEGISLATURE OF ARIZONA TERRITORY, PROPERLY IN SESSION, HAS THE POWER TO PASS A LAW PROVIDING FOR THE CALLING OF A CONSTITUTIONAL CONVENTION. Upon the wisdom of such legislation no opinion is expressed, and in discussing the power it is, of course, assumed that the legislation takes place within the sixty days allowed by law for the session. If, upon an examination, you are of the opinion that there is any question involved in either of these papers, or connected with them, upon which you wish an opinion from this Department, if you will be good enough to state the same I will be glad to reconsider the question and furnish such opinion. From a gentleman who recently arrived from Sonora, Mexico, we learn that the Omega mine has closed down, throwing forty-one men out of employment. The cause, seems to be a scarcity of water for the smelter. Plenty of water is to be had a short distance below the mines but is about 300 feet lower and will have to be pumped up. The owner, Mr. Whitmore, has gone to California to procure a boiler and sufficient piping for that purpose, as other necessary pumping machinery is already on the ground. The ore chutes are all filled with ore some of which assays twenty-eight per cent in lead and over 300 ounces in silver. There is plenty of good ore in sight—a mountain of it, in fact—and it is stated that the mine will be working in full blast within three months and probably within a month.
