New Game Law.

The following is a summary of the new game law:

Deer—Open season September 15 to November 1.

Antelope—Close to January 1, 1906.

Elk—closed.

Quail—Open season October 15 to March 1.

Grouse—Open season October 15 to March 1.

Wild turkey—Open season September 15 to November 1.

Dove—No law.

Pheasant—Open season October 15 to March 1.

Duck—Open season October 15 to March 1.

Geese and Swan—Open season October 15 to March 1.

Rail—Open season October 15 to March 1.

Trout—Open season June 1 to September 1, not less than six inches in length.

Any person who shall at any time sell, or expose for sale in this territory, any hide, head, horns or meat of any male or female deer, antelope, elk mountain sheep or mountain goat, or any carcass of any wild turkey, dove, bob white, quail, partridge, pheasant or grouse, or of any wild goose, duck, brant, spine or rail, or any brook, mountain or rainbow trout, or any black bass, strawberry bass or crappie, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.
