The Congress of Mexico has

recently passed a new coinage act, to go into effect on the first of January, whereby an almost prohibitive duty will be placed on all Mexican silver dollars of the present coinage that it is desired to import into that country. That is, the Mexican silver money that is outside of the Republic after the first of January cannot be carried back without paying a duty rate of 270 on the \$1000. Moreover, after that date, larger sums than \$5 cannot be taken in without being subject to duty at the rate mentioned.—El Paso News.

It is not everybody that knows that the government manufactures and issues postage stamps to suit the seasons. So far as the face of the stamps is concerned all are alike, but the gum on the back is varied to suit the temperature. Stamps issued for the cold months are backed by thinner and softer gum, and those manufactured for issuance in summer are just the reverse. Specially gummed stamps are issued for the southern states, so that they will not be affected by the heat.—Ex.
