The many friends of Miss Ida Lee will be pleased to know that she is gaining the high esteem of the people in San Juan County, New Mexico, where she is now teaching in the public schools. Miss Lee formerly taught school here and deserves the highest commendation as a young instructor. At a recent Teachers' Institute held at Farmington, Miss Lee was chosen Secretary and otherwise placed in responsible positions, as we see in the papers of that thriving town.

The Clerk of the District Court, Capt. Hogue, received the decisions rendered in the cases: John T. Hogue vs. Apache County, for Dist. Ct. Clerk salary claim for four years; Apache County vs. T. C. Hill, Ex-Treas., et al, damages. Judgment was rendered in favor of the Clerk in the first case, giving \$1,000 salary with interest, and costs; in the Hill case judgment for the County was for \$980 with interest, and costs. Alfred Ruiz, Esq., was the principal attorney for the plaintiff in both cases, neither of which has a case exactly similar in any given by the Legal Reports. In the one case the County has won nearly enough to pay the back salary due in the other, so that there is a balanced account in the two.
