MINING NEWS.

Tucson Star: There was some very rich oil sand brought in from Mammoth yesterday. The sand was taken from beneath the kaolin deposit and when a match is applied it will blaze until the oil has been consumed. It is said an expert in oil pronounced the presence of this sand as a certain indication of petroleum not deeper than five hundred feet.

Globe Belt: Fred G. Pendleton, clerk for the Lake Superior & Arizona Mining & Smelting Company is packing up the company's records and office furniture for shipment to Florence, where the office will be located in the future. The company has erected a warehouse and corral at the Florence depot of the Phoenix & Eastern railroad, and expect to have a residence and office building ready in a month.

Graham Bulletin: Another strike is reported in the Chiricahua mountains, near the town of San Simon. This find is only one mile from the King of Lead mine, which J. M. Burk recently sold to a Montana capitalist for a big figure. This find is a lead ore and carries large values in gold and silver and is located in what is called Wood cañon, fifteen miles from San Simon station. A prospector, who opened the vein, brought in samples of the ore, which shows very high grade lead, running as high as seventy per cent lead and carrying gold and silver.

Tucson Star: Speaking of the kaolin deposits near Mammoth, Wm. Atchley states that if the kaolin is pulverized and boiled in oil it makes a fine paint, and when applied to the walls of a house it is certain antidote for all kinds of insects, including ants. No insect life will exist near the kaolin paint or wash. It is also a fact that no kind of insect life has ever been seen about the kaolin deposit. Here is a pointer for some scientist to look into. The paint proposition might prove a source of profit to any who might take it up and determine its value as a paint.

Globe Register: A discovery of molybdenum has been made about two miles north of the Berkley mine in the Cedar district. The veins are immensely large, one of them being twenty or thirty feet in width and rises above the cañon to a height of fully two hundred feet. The surface ores carry high values in copper, but at the cañon level the copper cuts out and molybdenum of an exceedingly high grade comes in. On the walls of the veins are to be found large flakes of pure sulphur, evidently leachings from the molybdenum. This discovery of molybdenum is the first made in Arizona and is considered of great importance.

Tombstone Prospector: Conditions in the Tombstone Consolidated are gratifying. The battle against water in overwhelming quantities has been fought and won. A pluckier struggle has never been put up in the history of the industry on the Pacific coast. Ample means, conspicuous ability upon the management, and above all, unflinching confidence in the outcome, have all contributed to this happy result. Inch by inch the dif-

culty was overcome at heavy expense, and today, notwithstanding the recent rains, the underground conditions in the Tombstone Consolidated are more encouraging than at any previous stage of their operations. Few people ever stopped to consider what it costs to heat up that stream of four million gallons of water that flows daily away from the mine, and elevate the same over 700 feet. Now that the mine is being uncovered, the company will soon begin to get its money back.

Clifton Era: The Home Copper Co., board of directors held an important business meeting on Tuesday evening last and made a deal with John Molder whereby they transferred ten of their gold mine claims to him for 75,000 shares of Home Copper Co., stock which will be turned back to the treasury of their company. The claims purchased by Mr. Molder are known as the Buzzard's Shadow group located in the Copper mountain district about three miles from Morenci in the Morenci gold belt. The claims are the Buzzard's Shadow, Conqueror, Lillian, Gimini, Cracker Jack, Central Point, Ollie, Katy, Roosevelt and Globe. Mr. Molder intends to drive the Lillian tunnel right on through the mountain. This tunnel is already in about 300 feet and in a body of low grade free milling ore which runs from \$4 to \$5 per ton, and John is confident of cross-cutting a very rich body of ore farther in. He also will continue sinking the old shaft on the Buzzard Roost claim which some eighteen years ago furnished much ore which was shipped to Denver netting about \$50 per ton.

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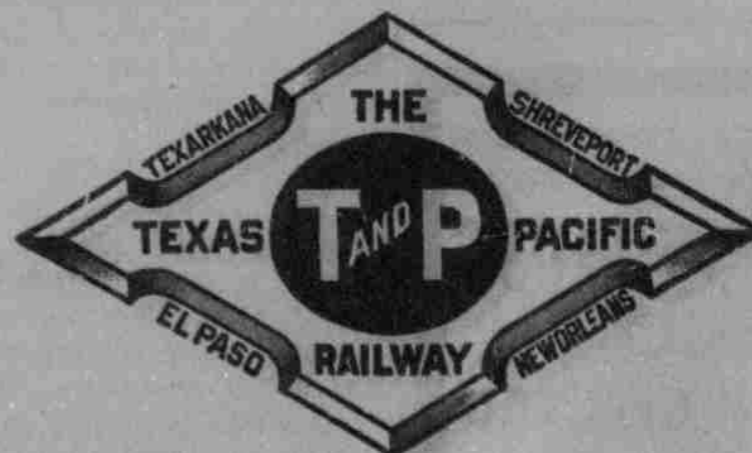
