TUCSON TOUR PLANS MADE

Committees On Arrangements and Publicity Appointed Plans for Mid-winter Auto Run to Old Pueblo.

Why is a Tucson tour? "To show 'em we can do it in the middle of winter; advertise Phoenix between the two cities and to promote motoring activities," is the chorus. And so the Maricopa Auto club got together and deputed Geo. Purdy Bullard, the president as a committee of one to get things started. Yesterday was the start in Governor Hunt's office at the state house, when about fifteen Phoenix motorists met and selected sub-committees on arrangements. The run is assured for the governor, Mr. Bullard, and the motorists as a whole are back of it, and Dr. Francis H. Covert and the Carnegie institute.

Redwill is chairman of the management corps. At the meeting yesterday over which Governor Hunt, president, Mr. Bullard proposed an organization to look after the details of the tour, and suggested Redwill as the man for the chairmanship of the committee as he had pulled off the Catalina Hot Springs run in such splendid shape. So the committee formed by Dr. Redwill was chosen as follows: R. Allyn Lewis, Win. Ferguson, Jack L. Holmes, George E. Morse and John McCondra. An additional publicity committee was chosen consisting of members of the staffs of the Phoenix Newspapers. January 17 was selected as the date for the run, the cars, about 100 already pledged, to leave this city at 9 in the morning. Here is the calendar of that day and the following, as outlined tentatively: Leave Phoenix Jan. 17 9 a. m. Arrive at Florence in time for the big special lunch which will be prepared by the governor's orders in the prison yard; arrive in Tucson in the afternoon, attend big banquet at a hotel and end the first day with a raging big dance to which the elite of the Old Pueblo will be invited. That is a pretty busy first day, but look at this. Second day: See Tucson, the San Xavier Mission, the University of Arizona, the deaf and dumb school, the government station on the arc back of it, and Dr. Francis H. Covert and the Carnegie institute.

Third day, (for those who wait over Saturday) the return trip taking in Florence again on the homeward journey, and arrive in Phoenix in time to rest up before Monday. But it is possible to inform some of the readers of the facts about the run, and those facts will be duly set forth day by day. The committee on arrangements will be glad to receive suggestions for stunts to make the Tucsonians set up and take notice. Here is one which was evolved last night by a member of the committee. Hire a hall, moving picture show will do, and pull off one of those some-what stunts such as please folks so much when they are properly handled. Some of the members of the committee are working on this stunt, and will no doubt have it all arranged in a short time. Drs. Schrader and Baker will handle the run from the Tucson end. They have been written long letters about it already. There will be a meeting of the arrangements committee today at the call of the chairman.
