Signed Letter Directed to Manager Mitchell of Street Car Company

The following letter was presented yesterday by the motormen and conductors of the Phoenix Street Railway Company following the discharge of William Ward on account of a controversy between the conductor and Inspector Bush.

Phoenix, Arizona, June 14, 1913. Mr. S. H. Mitchell, Manager, Phoenix Railway Co. of Arizona. Dear Sir: We, the undersigned employees of the Phoenix Railway Co., most respectfully request that you be given this according to our seniority, as is the custom of all other street railway companies.

And we also request that in case of any alleged infringement of our company's rules the accused be given a fair and impartial hearing. And in case of any controversy arising between the company and its motormen or conductors, we request that the same be settled by a committee composed of motormen, conductors and representatives of the company.

The season has come for canning peaches. This does not mean that this time of year it is proper to discharge the stenographer. It simply means that Harry Welch is now engaged in preserving specimens of the best fruit the valley produces. Besides peaches, apricots are also being canned here at the board of trade, and a long haul has gone out for more of this sort.

The long slim and the short stout jars are being washed out and made ready for additions to the already large family of fruit exhibits in the board of trade office. As first as proper specimens are brought in, they will be pickled and set up in nice neat rows with the other stuff and marked with the name of the contributor.

It was announced from the board of trade yesterday that all those who paid the sum of \$2.55 for their tickets to "See" on the Mines circuit may enter into the office of the board and collect four bits of it back in rebate. This is a rebate that is positively not against the law, and many will take advantage of it, just to see what it feels like to get something back from a railroad. The original rate was lowered to \$2.15, and all those who bought early in the game have half a dollar coming to them.

Membership Committee A joint meeting of farmers and membership committeemen will be the main happening in the board of trade the end of this week. On Saturday afternoon beginning at one o'clock farmers from all parts of the valley will meet with the membership committee to discuss getting more of the rural dwellers interested in the work of the board and on its rolls.

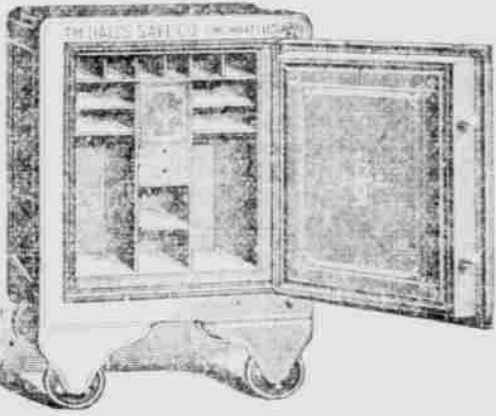
