## From Friday's Daily.

Louis Lombardy, an old Tombstone miner, came over last evening on business and will return tomorrow.  
There are now about twenty men working on the Head Center mine at Tombstone, upon which property A. L. Gray has a lease.  
The two sons of T. D. Hogan, aged about 5 and 7 years respectively, are confined to their beds from an attack of pneumonia. Mr. Hogan is employed in the company store.  
The members of St. John's guild are requested to be present at the social gathering in the opera house, Saturday evening, December 17, 1898.  
The raffle for the set of silver knives and forks at Chas. Bullitt's saloon last night, was won by Billy Lunge by a throw of forty-seven, and now Billy will no longer eat with a chop stick.  
We understand that the T. M. & M. company of Tombstone will soon give a lease on their mining property in that district, and it is said a large force of men will be put to work as soon as the lease is an assured fact.  
The brick masons resumed work yesterday morning on the company's new warehouse, but were forced to stop this morning by the snow.  
W. C. Land came in on the train last evening and will stop another train load of cattle to Bakersfield, Calif., in a few days.  
An article of much interest to miners and prospectors appears in this issue of "The Ore" touching the validity of our local mining laws. Cut it out and paste it in your scrap book for future reference.  
Yesterday the clouds began to gather for another storm, and last night at an early hour the rain began to fall in copious showers, but before daylight the nature of the storm had changed, and this morning a thick veil of the "beautiful" covered the face of mother nature. At this writing the streets of our town are a perfect lollibol of melting snow and mud.  
E. B. Mason, superintendent of the Bisbee water works, has bought 100 feet square of land from Thos. Higgins and will erect a brick residence as soon as the weather will permit. He is now digging a trench from the company's pump house and laying water pipes to his new possessions. It is among the probabilities that the company will, in the near future, erect a large reservoir upon Mr. Mason's holdings for the purpose of supplying water to families living upon elevated ground in that section of this great copper camp.  
The South Bisbee Copper Mining and Townsite company, at their No. 2 shaft on the corners of the Magnet, a triangle and John P., Jr. claims about one mile south of Bisbee, are now down to a depth of 360 feet, and at this level the indications are very good. The company are working fourteen men at this shaft and the management here are sanguine of striking a body of ore at this point. They say at this shaft a 75-horse power steel boiler and a 30-horse power hoist, which is capable of hoisting ore at a depth of 1000 feet. Assessment work has been done upon all the properties purchased by the company, and the new year will begin auspiciously for the South Bisbee Townsite people.

## The Double Funeral.

The funeral of W. P. Ferrier, an account of whose death was given in yesterday's Ore, took place from Library Hall today at 1 o'clock. The funeral services were held by Rev. Pritchard, and was attended by a large number of our people including the miners and comrades of the deceased, and in order that they might do so both the Car and Hobcock mines were closed down, to fact all of the Queen works except the smelter were closed for the day. The remains were laid to rest in the City Cemetery to await the summons at the last great day, when the grave and the sea, shall give up their dead and we shall all be called to give an account of the deeds done in the body.  
The funeral of the late Joseph Butler who came to his death in the lone hours of the night by falling and striking his head upon a rock, an account of which appeared in the Ore yesterday, also took place from the Library Hall, at the same hour as that of W. P. Ferrier, the funeral service being conducted by the same pastor. The occasion was one of great solemnity, for both men were well and favorably known and had many friends who were deeply moved at their sudden and untimely taking away. May their reward be one of peace for all eternity.

## ACCIDENTALLY KILLED.

### Two of Our Citizens Meet Death by Different Accidents.

Early this morning as the miners and others were going to work, they noticed a man lying against the bulkhead between the Copper Queen warehouse and company office. Several passed by thinking the man was drunk, but others, noticing blood on the rocks, went to the man and found him cold in death. The body was immediately recognized as that of Joseph F. Butler, an old time resident and miner of Bisbee.  
Upon the finding of the body, Coroner Williams was notified and a jury summoned at once. Upon examining the body it was found that the neck was broken and deep gash cut on the forehead. The deceased had been drinking during the early part of yesterday evening and was on his way home, when, it is supposed, he fell, breaking his neck and cutting his head on the rocks.  
Butler was fifty-eight years of age and has been a resident of Bisbee for some time. He formerly worked in Tombstone and other mining camps in the territory.  
This morning about ten o'clock, W. T. Farrier, a miner employed in the Hobcock mine, was accidentally killed by being crushed between a tool car and the side of the shaft and afterward falling to the bottom of the shaft.  
Farrier was working on the 400 foot level and started up the shaft with a carload of tools, he neglected when getting on the cage to drop the bar that holds the car on which slipped from its place and caught on the timbers between the 200 and 300 foot levels, upsetting it and breaking the bottom out of the cage. Farrier falling to the 500-foot level into the sump. The body was mangled badly, but Farrier was undoubtedly dead before he fell as a wound in the stomach shows where one of the drills or a pick was forced through him.  
The body was brought to the surface and a coroner's jury summoned, who have not rendered their verdict at this writing.  
The deceased was about 35 years of age, and has been in the employ of the company for a little over a year.
