A DANGEROUS WEAPON.

The boycott is a weapon more dangerous to those who wield it than it is to those against whom it is directed. It's a boomerang employed by cowards.

An exchange says that the Cleveland people who are now coming to their senses, have discovered that society would be intolerable if it had no defense against the boycott, can take example of St. Louis. In 1898 there was a great railroad strike in the west on the Gould lines. The boycott was then resorted to and applied in St. Louis against merchants, professional men, butchers and bakers and all who have dealings with the public. But the St. Louis people were equal to the occasion. They immediately organized and gave the boycotters to understand that they would be remembered, and when order was restored they too would find themselves under the ban that would sour and burn to the bone. Every dealer who truckled to the boycott and gave it support was put into the category of the boycott itself, and warned that those assailed by the boycott would strike back. The result was that the boycott collapsed. Like the coward that it is, it whined and withdrew its supporters and went groveling in the dust to have the ban lifted from them. It was a case of fighting fire with fire, and the right won. Retaliation is not to be approved; the taking of the law into one's own hands cannot be advised. But when a man is driven into a corner, innocent of offense and for simply pursuing his inalienable right as a man, he is a cowardly cur who will not strike back. If the Cleveland people had the wit and courage of those of St. Louis they would never have covered under the club of the boycott.

THE NORTH pole may as well surrender as the British government is going to attack it. The British navy, which has done nothing in the way of Arctic exploration for twenty-five years, proposes to pay out \$45,000 in an expedition which will be equipped with a monster ice-breaking steamer like the noted Russian boat Ermack, which smashes ice many feet thick. However, British financial and military resources may be sufficiently tested by the Boers, without undertaking any side issues at this time.

The opponents of Mr. W. J. Bryan do not hesitate to employ dirty methods in their efforts to injure him. It has been thirty-four years since the north and south were at war, yet the Chattanooga Times tries to arouse against Mr. Bryan the bitter hates of that unfortunate conflict. The Chattanooga paper says that Mr. Bryan refused to vote for the late Mr. Crisp of Georgia, for speaker on the ground that Mr. Crisp was an ex-Confederate soldier. The records will show that Mr. Bryan voted for Mr. Crisp twice for the speakership.

IN THESE days of harrowing uncertainty the republicans are not overlooking any crumbs of consolation. The St. Louis Globe-Democrat says: "The adoption of the single gold standard and expansion planks in the republican convention in Lyon county, Kansas, show how that state stands on those two issues. There was some opposition to a square out and out deliverance in favor of gold, but only two votes could be mustered by its opponents." The republicans do not cut much ice in Kansas. Since the fall of Ingalls they have all gone over to the populist party. Besides the action of a handful of government office holders in Lyon county is no indication of the sentiments of the republicans of the state of Kansas.

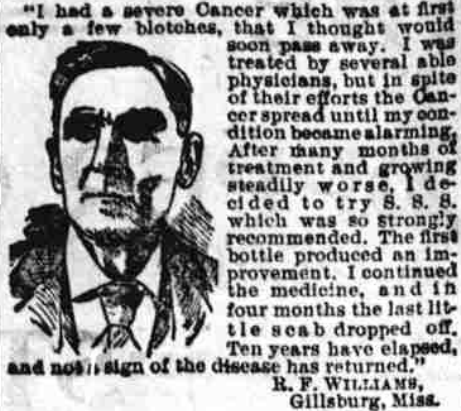
SAYS THE Boston Transcript: Mr. George H. Burr, president of the St. Johns (Kansas) Trust company, who has just returned from a western trip, gives cheering accounts of the financial condition in that section. "Money," said he, "is cheaper today in Indianapolis, Chicago and St. Louis than it is in Boston. I do not believe that the west will have to borrow a dollar from the east this year to move its crops, except possibly to draw on its eastern balances. The state banks of Kansas have gained \$1,500,000 in deposits for the three months ending July 30. As to the crops they are almost beyond comparison." It is now in order for the organs to claim that the republican administration is responsible for the good crops. The Dallas News and San Antonio Express neglected to lay at the door of McKinley responsibility for the Brazos valley flood.

The attorney-general of Nebraska, Saturday last, began suit at Omaha against the Standard Oil company for violation of the anti-trust law enacted by a republican congress. This should be done in every state in the Union. The company should be given a lively contest and if the congressional statute can not be enforced, one will be enacted that can be. A fight all along the line will have the effect of showing that the people are in earnest in their intention to restrain this corporation. It is not the proper thing to be supine in the matter and take it for granted that the federal statute will not or can not be enforced. Nor is it incumbent upon any state to wait a decision in the Omaha case. The more suits the better. Each state has a salaried attorney-general to attend to legal business of this character, but the oil monopoly will have to employ expensive lawyers and may after a while learn that it is cheaper to be reasonably decent and fair than to have to defend expensive suits in every state in the Union.
