TELEGRAPHIC SPARKS

Fresh From the Wires from All Points.

Chicago, Sept. 7.—President McKinley is now a trades union man. He was today elected a member of the Bricklayers' and Stonemasons' Union of Chicago. President Gubbins of the Union said he lay that since the chief executive was to lay the corner stone of the new postoffice it was necessary that the president join the Union before he be allowed to handle a trowel in Cook county. A card of honorary membership has been made out and will be forwarded to the President. "We will have to take the card away," said Secretary Starn. "If Mr. McKinley sets a stone prepared by non-union labor, which the same intended for the corner of the new postoffice, and as a national organization we will have to strike on any building at which he does any construction work."

Washington, Sept. 7.—The president proposes to continue General Shafter in command of the department of the Pacific after the time for his retirement September 14. General Lawton who has rank of colonel in the regular army will be made Brigadier-General. General McArthur, now Lieutenant-Colonel in the regular establishment will also be made brigadier and so will General Wheaton.

The Storm Yesterday.

Yesterday afternoon about 3 o'clock black, lowering clouds made their appearance from the north and northwest, which became more dense and threatening as they approached the Mule Mountains. They were not surcharged with electricity; but those of our people who have witnessed floods in the past knew that one was fast drawing nigh. About 3:30 the water began to come down, and in a very few minutes a perfect deluge was descending. Every little gulch on the side hills became a small river, and when the whole body of water reached the two main canyons—Tombstone and Broadway—they at once became roaring torrents, carrying everything that was moveable before it.

The downpour appeared to be the heaviest on the hills south and west of town, though it was a perfect avalanche on all sides, and great bodies of earth were moved from their places and deposited in the streets and in the road west of town, but the heaviest landslide was from the hill directly south of town. A body of rocks and earth weighing perhaps more than a thousand tons was washed down from the side hill and deposited on the railroad track in the rear of Library Hall, and had it not been for the openings between the houses, through which the accumulated water could escape, there is but little doubt that the row of adobe buildings south of Main street, including the Queen Hotel, Mansion house, Turf and Free Coinage saloons, would be a pile of ruins this morning. As it was a perfect river of water ran through the hallway of the Queen hotel, and also through the openings between the buildings, which if it had not escaped in this way would have melted these adobe buildings down, for the mud and rocks had formed a perfect dam on the railroad track and the water would have accumulated to a depth of at least from six to ten feet against the buildings.

As soon as it was possible, after the rain had ceased, a large number of men were put to work removing the mud and rocks from the road and worked continuously through the night, having made but little progress on the vast pile up to daylight this morning, but they will probably get enough removed today to admit of the engine passing up and down the track.

Another slide occurred in Tombstone Canyon, just east of Dr. Edmondson's residence, and at the west end of the Clauson grade. A pile of rocks and mud was washed from the hill side and left in the road to the depth of from four to six feet and about thirty feet wide, completely obstructing the road. At the turn of the road, just west of the Palace livery stable, the rocks were piled up to a considerable depth, changing the driveway to the south side of the gulch.

All the cellars on the north side of Main street were flooded and considerable damage done and loss sustained by different ones having cigars, wines, liquors and other materials stored therein. Happily no houses were washed away, nor no one injured, so far as we have heard; but for a rain-storm, the flood of yesterday was one of the old-fashioned sort—the kind we read about, but seldom witness.
