TELEGRAPHIC SPARKS

Fresh From the Wires from All Points.

San Francisco, Sept. 8.—One of the most notable architectural competitions ever known was ended tonight when there was rendered what will doubtless be the final decision in the Phoebe Hearst contest for plans for a group of buildings to be erected at Berkeley for the use of the University of California. These magnificent structures as designed will cost between ten and fifteen million dollars, and the total expenditures required to carry out in its completion the idea of erecting here the finest educational equipment in the world will exceed the larger sum mentioned. The winner of the first prize for the proposed design is E. Beaudouin of Paris, who will receive a premium of \$10,000 for his plans.

The architecture of all the buildings will be classic, of the Grecian type, with modern variations to adapt them to the purposes for which they are designed.

Washington, Sept. 8.—Activity in the war department offices and the close figuring that is being done regarding the available force for the Philippines, indicate an early movement. It has been known that a forward movement was contemplated in November, but there are now indications favorable that the campaign may begin at least a month earlier if there are favorable weather conditions. By October 1 General O'is will have an army of 31,000 effective men.

They are having some trouble in Benson over school matters, in this. It appears, from an editorial in the "Breeze," that the school trustees in our neighboring town have employed a gentleman to teach in the school at that place who is afflicted with tuberculosis. At least one physician has so certified, and now the board say they don't want anyone so afflicted to be in the school with the children, which in justice to all is perfectly right. But, as the Breeze suggests, it would be hardly fair to take the action of one man in a matter where great injustice might possibly be inflicted upon another. Hence it would be but fair to all concerned for the teacher, who has been employed, to undergo an examination by other physicians, and if they confirm the judgment of the one who has already certified in the case, then the gentleman should gracefully withdraw. Others, who he ought to be allowed to fill his contract with the board and teach the term out.

Our Mexican friends at New are making great preparations for a glorious time on the 15th and 16th at their celebration of Mexico's day of Liberation from the yoke of Spain. All kinds of amusing games will be had, and especially those peculiar to the Mexican people, such as full-fights, horse-racing, cock-fighting, jupese acting and various other athletic sports, etc. Orders will be there to declare the people of Mexico, under a republican form of government, just to see it all up in a few words, it will be a regular old-fashioned Fourth of July celebration.

At every opportunity, precaution should be taken against floods. If this was done much inconvenience might be avoided and the damage sustained. The plan to extend the bulk head from the flood gate to the company warehouse, which was talked of some time ago, but never put into execution, was good and for the best interests of the property owners on the north side of Main street. As it now is, all the cellars in that row are liable to fill every time it rains sufficiently hard to make the gulch run, thereby causing much damage to the persons occupying the buildings, most of whom are renters.

According to a dispatch to the Salt Lake Herald from Vernal, Utah, the dockmasters of that section have struck another snag, which adds to the inconvenience they have experienced since the exclusion of sheep from the timber reserves. A number of herds have been moving in the direction of the Uintah reservation since the admission of sheep at the rate of \$50 per 1,000, and the Indians, fearing that the range for their ponies will be seriously affected, are now making a loud protest, and is reported that no more will be allowed to enter until further notice.
