

LOCAL BRIEFS.

C. B. Ming was yesterday appointed notary public for Maricopa county.

The county registration of voters will begin at the county recorder's office today.

A. Wallace, a mining engineer from Lorburg, N. M., is stopping at the Central hotel.

Twenty-eight instruments were filed in the county recorder's office yesterday making the heaviest day's business of the year.

The Chinese social at the Presbyterian church last night was a very pleasurable, unique and successful entertainment.

A glove contest was arranged yesterday to take place in Phoenix on April 18, between Tom Carter, the colored light-weight and Ed Morrissey, of Philadelphia.

Suit was begun in district court yesterday by Ben Block vs. M. Wormser for an accounting to bring about a settlement of a joint business of several years standing.

The case of Elie Rochefort for assault with a deadly weapon and assault with intent to kill were continued before Justice Kincaid yesterday until 10 o'clock on Wednesday morning.

Police court had a tonic yesterday morning, a Mexican named "Quinine," run in for drunkenness. Joseph Taylor on the same charge was his companion in imprisonment. Both were discharged.

The board of supervisors were in session yesterday. The business transacted consisted chiefly of allowing claims. An order was entered to advertise for bids for painting the court house roof.

Al Marsh came down from Minnehaha Flats yesterday with a quantity of bullion taken from the Favorite mine. Mr. Marsh is quite lame, the result of an accident some time ago, and he will remain in the city for treatment.

A series of revival meetings beginning last night, will be in progress at the Center street M. E. church south all this week. These meetings following the district conference will derive considerable impetus from that very successful and enthusiastic session.

A license to marry was issued yesterday to J. T. Ware and Miss Minnie Rodgers. Miss Rodgers arrived in the city yesterday morning from Montgomery City, Mo., and was met by her future husband who lives at Alhambra, where the happy couple will make their home.

Late on Sunday afternoon a plug in one of the boilers at the Phoenix Light and Power company's was blown out so that the lights didn't shine that night on the Philadelphia moonlight schedule. The damage was repaired and the light turned on about 11 o'clock.

Geo. W. Tutt, of the Elmo restaurant, which opened its doors yesterday, did everything that he promised in the way of placing on the tables edibles, cook first class and the service of the same order. The linen and table appointments were everything that the most fastidious could ask.

Adjutant General Schwartz yesterday

received a letter from Maj. Augustus H. Bainbridge, detailed to inspect the National Guard of Arizona. Maj. Bainbridge is at Stanton, N. M., and writes that he is awaiting further orders from the war department before proceeding on his tour of inspection.

It is difficult to figure out the affinity between Navajo blankets and musical instruments, but Mr. J. H. Zeigenfus, manager of the Phoenix Music company, believes there is some and has apparently engaged to take the product of all the Navajo looms. It may be that the colors are harmonious, though resonant.

Jose Contreras licked Apollonio Palomares last Sunday, but not half as bad as Corbett licked Mitchell. Juan was before Justice Johnstone yesterday for it. The justice has a mission to discourage these passages at arms and he sent Juan to the county jail for fifteen days. Hereafter Juan will do his fighting in Florida.

Josefa Vijas was arrested yesterday by Deputy United States Marshal Slankard for setting at naught the Edmunds law. Josefa is a citizen of Tucson, but at the time of her arrest was visiting in Phoenix, where the sin was committed. She says Ramon Jorquez ought to be arrested, too. He is supposed to be at Florence.

Dr. W. W. Jones returned yesterday from a successful prospecting trip in the Eagle Tail mountains. His friends who were ignorant of his whereabouts were considerably alarmed about him as a report had gained circulation that he had died on the desert and on Sunday Col. Ridley came to town to make inquiry as to the authenticity of the report.

Dr. Cameron Gordon, of Livermore, Cal., at present on a visit to his brother, G. B. Gordon, of Phoenix, has driven over the valley both west and east and expresses surprise at seeing such beautiful fields of alfalfa stretching away on every side, many of them filled with fat cattle and horses. He is pleased with Phoenix and may come to reside.

Geo. McLaren and Van Johnson were before Justice Kincaid yesterday for fighting on Saturday night. McLaren pled guilty and was fined \$5. Johnson entered a similar plea and received a similar fine, whereupon he withdrew his plea, demanded a jury trial and took a change of venue to Justice Johnstone's court where the trial will take place today.

THE ANGELS' FEAST.

The Great Display Beginning at Los Angeles Tomorrow.

Los Angeles, Cal., April 9.—The final preparation for the celebration of La Fiesta which commences tomorrow and lasts throughout the week have been made. The city is profusely decorated with palm leaves and colors emblematic of that which produces the wealth of southern California, "The Orange, The Olive and the Juice of the Grape."

The pageant tomorrow will be a grand spectacle, but it is said it will be entirely eclipsed by the illuminated parade on Wednesday night when it is estimated that there will be fully 20,000 persons in line, all in costume.

A FOUL BY HILL.

The New York Senator Forgets Himself

And Strikes His Enemy While He's Down.

He Sends a Broadside Into the Administration.

He Predicts that the Present Course will Cause Democracy the Loss of the Senate and President.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Senator Hill delivered a speech in the senate today that was chiefly devoted to a bitter attack on the income tax feature of the Wilson bill.

He criticized the administration for its blunders in the Hawaiian affair. He held that with the growing treasury deficit and the paralyzed industries this is a bad time for extreme tariff reductions. He protested in the name of all the people of New York against the income tax. No party but the Populists proposed this method of raising funds and the Democrats didn't want to be the tail the Populist kite. He preferred an indirect taxation in a tariff reform to the direct taxes and tariff extraction. He preferred taxing foreign rather than home products.

He said he would vote for any reasonable tariff bill, the Mills bill for instance. He said the failure of tariff revision meant the defeat of the Democratic position. Supporters of the income tax realize that it means the loss of control of the senate and the next presidency to the Democracy.

The Mexican Dollar Scheme.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Mr. Wolcott addressed the senate in support of the resolution looking to the coinage of Mexican dollars for the China trade. Mr. Wolcott said the resolution did not affect the general question of bi-metallicism, but was simply a suggestion to a friendly sister republic that our idle mints in the west should be in operation in the coinage of silver to be put in circulation in the orient. Such a proposal, he said, could not have been made with regard to silver had there been more favorable legislation, but the veto of the seigniorage bill left us free to act on the resolution. While the seigniorage bill was utterly important the lesson of its veto was invaluable. Action on the resolution was deferred until tomorrow.

The House Attracted.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—The house was depopulated today. Three-fourths of the members were at the senate listening to Senator Hill's speech on the tariff. Those who remained were occupied with District of Columbia affairs, but little actual business was transacted. An adjournment was taken at 5 p. m.

To Pension U. S. Judges.

WASHINGTON, April 9.—Senator Marting of Kansas has two bills before the senate committee on judiciary which provide for the retirement on full pay of United States judges. One of them provides for retirement after twenty years of continuous service and other on account of physical or mental disability.

A Prominent Populist on Trial.

KANSAS CITY, April 9.—The trial of Joseph A. Smith, a Kansas lawyer and Populist for criminal libel, began in Kansas City, Kans., today. All the leading Populists of Kansas have been subpoenaed as witnesses including Gov. Lewelling and Mrs. Lease. The day was consumed in getting a jury.

Delinquent Tax Sales.

The sale of property for delinquent taxes was completed yesterday except that for the taxes of 1890-91-92 which have been in litigation. The protests in the cases having been sustained the county authorities decided to reassess the property rather than to appeal. This property will be offered for sale today. Under the late law protests are unavailing, the only remedy of unwilling taxpayers being in restraining orders against the sale. The courts having refused to grant such orders there is nothing left the taxpayers to do but become payers in fact.
