STOLEN BICYCLES.

A Kind of Property Likely to Burn Thieves' Fingers.

Two bicycles were stolen last Saturday night. One from Dr. Tuttle and the other from E. M. Dorris. One result of the theft from the doctor was to convince him how big Phoenix is. His rounds were made on foot the next day and the streets seem to have increased in length ten fold. Basing his estimate of the city's population on its size he is willing to make affidavit to about 35,000. The character of the plunder proves that the thieves are inexperienced. There is nothing on earth so difficult to successfully steal as a bicycle. The Columbia and Victor companies and nearly all leading manufacturing companies make the theft of their wheels a personal matter and offer a standing reward for the recovery of the property and the punishment of the thief so that search and prosecution are always vigorous. All wheels are numbered and thereby easily recognized. They cannot be sold, used or removed from the neighborhood without detection.

On account of these safeguards thrown about bicycles owners seldom take the usual precautions for the preservation of property. This is why one may see wheels ranging in value from \$100 to \$150 left in unguarded hallways and porches.

A SUCCESSFUL SCHOOL TERM.

Advantages of Communication Between Teacher and Pupil.

The school in district No. 36, taught by Mr. Richard Stuart for the past eight months, closed last week. The district is one in which the Spanish language is spoken almost exclusively and the fact that frequently teachers have been employed who were unfamiliar or imperfectly familiar with the language has been unfortunate for the progress of the pupils. Mr. Stuart was chosen as teacher on account of his reputation as a Spanish scholar and the result has been so highly satisfactory that the trustees extended the school to the extreme limit of the funds and at the close of the term incorporated the following testimonial into the minutes of the board:

The thanks of the district are justly due and are hereby tendered for the entire district to Richard Stuart for his zealous and faithful services as teacher and for the gratifying results in the way of advancement among his pupils. We as trustees fully approve of his course and attribute his success to his methods which have nothing of unnecessary formality or discipline and to the fact of his being able through his knowledge of Spanish to put himself in sympathetic communication with his pupils.

Of the 82 children of school age in the district 64 were enrolled and an average of 39 attended daily.

Phoenix Obiterated. Both the geography and ears of the San Francisco Chronicle reporter who interviewed Judge Baker last Friday are defective. He stations the judge in Tucson instead of in Phoenix and causes him to say many nice and encouraging things of the old pueblo. It is gathered from the interview that the North and South road is completed to within sixty miles of Tucson and that when that terminus is reached the valley of the Santa Cruz will bloom and blossom with prosperity. The reporter viewed Phoenix off the map with an indifference which must be painful to those who believe the Salt River valley is a consequential feature of the territory.

One (1) Councilman for the Second ward for the term of two years.
One (1) Councilman for the Fourth ward for the term of two years.
