One (1) Treasurer for the term of one year. One (1) Marshal for the term of one year. One (1) Assessor and tax collector for the term of one year. One (1) Councilman for the Second ward for the term of two years. One (1) Councilman for the Fourth ward for the term of two years. McNeill; judges, John Burger, J. W. Walker; ballot clerks, W. R. Morrison, Geo. H. Marsh; poll clerks, Porter Fleming, R. A. Lewis. Third Ward, polls at Kincaid's office—Inspector, J. B. Lacy; judges, B. A. Fickas, J. D. Monahan; ballot clerks, T. D. Molloy, Richard Stewart; poll clerks, G. W. Chapman, F. Perley. Fourth Ward, polls at Dublin corral—Inspector, C. F. Chapman; judges, T. A. Jobs, J. D. Reid; ballot clerks, J. S. Beyers, Lincoln Fowler; poll clerks, F. Ordona, W. B. Lount. By order of the common council of the city of Phoenix.
