

NABBED IN COURT.

Geo. Beckers with an Indictment Hanging Over Him

Recklessly Provokes Fate by Becoming a Casual Spectator in Federal Court.

Justice, eye bandaged and leaden footed has a way of making short and unexpected cuts like the blind man in "Barnaby Rudge" and bringing up suddenly in front of agile crime. This is not a desultory observation but a literal quotation from the ruminations yesterday of Mr. Geo. T. Beckers who visited United States district court as a member of the audience and was suddenly given a leading part in the cast.

Four years ago Mr. Beckers was indicted for a violation of the Edmunds act. He was released on bond and one of the bondsmen was Mr. A. Starkweather. Beckers didn't wait for the case to come to trial. When the next session of court rolled around Mr. Beckers didn't roll and his bond was declared forfeited but was found to be uncollectable.

Beckers was afterward caught and Mr. Starkweather again became a voucher for his appearance. Again Beckers skipped and again his bond was declared forfeited but was never collected. Beckers returned recently and again associated himself with Mr. Starkweather. He evidently believed that the storm of Mr. Edmunds' wrath had blown over and that his little alleged indiscretion was forgotten.

Here arises another incident that seriously affects his fortunes. His friend Mr. Starkweather is the occupant of a section of school land lying on Grand avenue. So sure of his right to possession of it was he that he sequestered it from the rest of the government domain by a substantial fence. About this time the right of way for the Santa Fe, Prescott & Phoenix railroad meandered down toward Phoenix. It finally bumped up against Mr. Starkweather's fence and a hiatus as long as that section of land was created in the right of way. In the meantime Mr. Starkweather had been indicted for holding possession of the land and the indictment has since been hanging over him.

This school land brought Mr. Starkweather into conflict with United States District Attorney Ellinwood and his conduct was particularly offensive.

Like all good natured and liberal minded men the United States district attorney when he gets started in any direction will pursue it with a pertinacity which sets all obstacles aside. He had started in Mr. Starkweather's direction and yesterday morning that gentleman discovered that Mr. Ellinwood had arrived in his vicinity and was still coming. The attorney discovered that Beckers, the long wanted and often absent Beckers, was in court. He had him nabbed, brought up and arraigned on that all but forgotten and lost covered indictment. Again the bond question presented itself and the attorney determined that this time the bond should be of a character that should insure the defendant's appearance or make good his absence and such a bond was procured.

Nor is that all, the attorney proposes to proceed against the delinquent bondsman, Mr. Starkweather. The trial of Loache the murderer of Pa-pa-je at the upper Pima reservation three weeks ago was begun. The theory was self defense or rather defense against injuries which Loache unreasonable said he feared would be inflicted upon him. The evidence was concluded and the arguments were reserved for this morning.

Patrick Marks whose partner Wm. Jones was convicted the day before of burglarizing Ganz's bottling works pleaded guilty to burglary in the second degree.
