ORDINANCE NO. 168. An Ordinance to License and Regulate the Keeping of Dogs.

The Common Council of Phoenix do ordain as follows: SECTION I. Every person who owns, keeps or harbors in the City of Phoenix any dog or dogs, shall pay an annual license thereof of Two Dollars for each male dog, and Four Dollars for each female dog.

SECTION II. Every person desiring to obtain license for dogs to be kept in the City of Phoenix shall pay such license to the City Assessor and Tax Collector at his office and in amount for each dog as provided by Section 1 of this ordinance.

SECTION III. The City Marshal shall procure and keep in his office such number of metal tags as may be necessary, and of such size and shape as he shall deem expedient, having stamped thereon the words "Phoenix Dog License" (the shape of said tags to be changed each year).

SECTION IV. It shall be unlawful for any dog to run at large in any of the streets, alleys, plazas, parks or public grounds of the City of Phoenix without having fastened over its head a muzzle suitable and sufficient to keep and prevent such dog from being able to bite man or beast.

SECTION V. It shall be the duty of the city marshal, the police officers or watchmen of the City of Phoenix and of each and all of them, when any dog is found loose, or at large upon the public streets, alleys, plazas, parks or public grounds of the said city, either without the license tag and muzzle, or the license tag herein provided for to immediately kill such dog at the place found or capture and secure such dog and remove him to a convenient place, and there immediately kill him as may under the circumstances of the case be most expedient.

SECTION VI. The licenses issued under this ordinance shall expire on the 10th day of June, 1895, and thereafter be renewed or issued to expire on the 10th day of each and every June.

SECTION VII. Any person or persons who own or not owning harbor for a period of three days within the City of Phoenix any dog without procuring a license for said dog, as by this ordinance provided, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor and on conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than Five nor more than Twenty-five Dollars.

SECTION VIII. Any person who allows any dog owned by him or under his control to run at large on the street, alleys, plazas, parks or public ground of the City of Phoenix in violation of the provisions of section V of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars for each and every such offense.

SECTION IX. Any person who allows any dog owned by him or under his control to run at large on the street, alleys, plazas, parks or public ground of the City of Phoenix in violation of the provisions of section V of this ordinance shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and upon conviction thereof shall be fined in any sum not less than Ten Dollars nor more than One Hundred Dollars for each and every such offense.

SECTION X. Ordinance No. 97, entitled "An Ordinance to Provide for Licensing Dogs" and all other ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION XI. This Ordinance shall be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.
