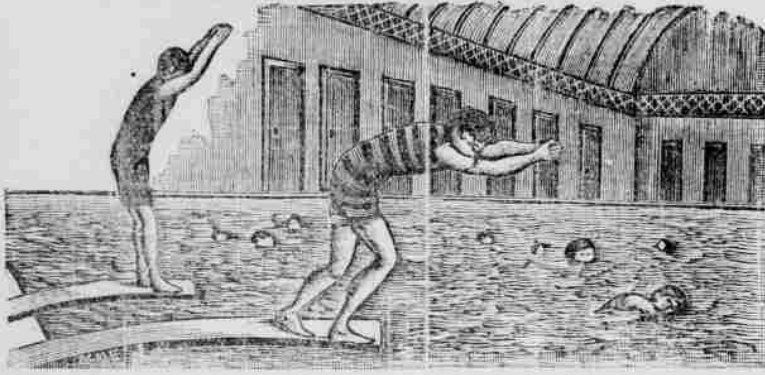

OUR GOLDEN SUBURB.

New and interesting facts concerning Goldfield Camp.

The Goldfield mining camp is situated, that is to say the postoffice is, in Pinal county about 2,600 feet from the north boundary line. The town rests in a depression of the Superstition mountain range on what may be termed low rolling foot hills that skirt a dry wash, in which the works of the Mammoth No. 1 are located. There are about 350 or 400 people living in and about the camp, about seventy of whom are employed directly or indirectly by Messrs. Hall & Sullivan.
