BLACK JACK'S INQUEST.

The Manner of Her Death Not Yet Determined.

The Story of Pete, an Indian, Who Admits Having Seen Kow Keossa on Sunday Evening.

The investigation of the death of "Black Jack," the Pima squaw, is still in progress. Only one witness was examined yesterday, but important disclosures were made.

Pete was approached from all sides, and though he did not leave a good impression he maintained a reasonable monotony of narrative.

He said that a Chinaman asked him on Sunday to find an Indian female companion for him and offered to pay her \$5. The witness saw Black Jack late on Sunday afternoon and told her of the Chinaman's princely offer.

When they had reached a point near the Maricopa road and not far from the spot where Black Jack's body was afterward found they met the Chinaman who was engaged in turning water into a ditch.

Pete is a relative of the Indian police on the reservation. He was seen in town on Sunday and on horseback on the road home in the evening.

The Indians have supplemented the burial given the body of Black Jack. According to a custom of the tribe each brought a stone and threw it on the grave so that now a huge mound of stones marks the resting place of the unfortunate squaw.
