Election Proclamation.

UNITED STATES OF AMERICA, ss. TERRITORY OF ARIZONA.

Whereas under an Act of the Legislative Assembly of the Territory of Arizona entitled "Elections," approved March 28, 1887, it is provided that an election shall be held throughout the Territory upon the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1894, and every two years thereafter, and that members of the Legislative Assembly and such other officers as may be required by law shall be chosen at such election; and

WHEREAS, It is further provided in said Act that at least thirty days before the general election, the Governor must issue an election proclamation, designating the time of the election and the offices to be filled.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, Louis C. Hughes, Governor of Arizona, in pursuance of the duty enjoined upon me, do hereby order a general election to be held on the Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D., 1894; and the offices to be filled at such election are hereby designated as follows, to-wit:

One delegate to the Fifty-fourth congress of the United States.

Twelve members of the council of the legislative assembly of Arizona.

Twenty-four members of the house of the legislative assembly of Arizona, apportioned agreeably to existing laws as follows:

Table with 4 columns: Counties, No. Mem. of the Council, No. Mem. of the House. Lists counties like Apache, Cochise, Gila, Graham, Maricopa, Mohave, Pima, Pinal, Yavapai, Yuma.

And the various counties shall jointly elect one member of the council. And there shall be elected in each county of the territory, one probate judge, one district attorney, one sheriff, one treasurer, one recorder, one surveyor, two members of the board of supervisors, except in Pima county where three members shall be elected, and in each of the counties where the office has not been consolidated with the office of sheriff, one assessor shall be elected.

Also in the several precincts of each county, one justice of the peace and one constable shall be elected, and in such precincts as are entitled to two justices of the peace and two constables, that number shall be elected.

And I do hereby offer a reward of fifty dollars for the arrest and conviction of any and every person violating any of the provisions of title IV, part I, of the penal code.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, I have hereunto set my hand and caused the great seal of the territory to be affixed this twenty-seventh day of September, A. D. 1894.

ORDINANCE NO. 176.

An ordinance entitled an ordinance for the purpose of improving Washington street, on the north side thereof, between First avenue and Second avenue, in the city of Phoenix.

WHEREAS: A petition has been filed with the city recorder and city council of the city of Phoenix, signed by a majority of the owners of the frontage on Washington street in the city of Phoenix, between First street and Second street, of said city, asking that said side of Washington street, between said First and second streets, be improved by the laying of a cement sidewalk and granite or concrete curb thereon, where not already so done along the said frontage.

NOW, therefore, The common council of Phoenix do ordain as follows: SECTION 1. That there be and hereby 'is or to be constructed by special taxation of contiguous property on the north side of Washington street, between First street and Second street in the city of Phoenix, Maricopa county, territory of Arizona, an artificial stone, or cement sidewalk with granite or concrete curb, where not already done along the frontage above described.

SEC. 2. Said artificial stone or cement sidewalk and granite or concrete curbs shall be constructed in accordance with the plans and specifications for such work heretofore, on the 6th day of August, 1894, by the common council of Phoenix approved and adopted.

SEC. 3. This ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage and publication according to law.

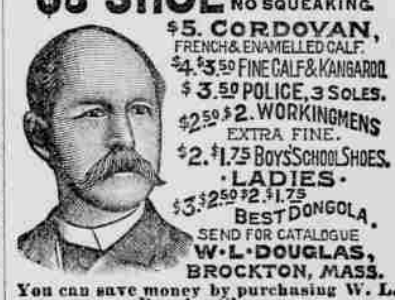
