WHY HE WAS PROMOTED. The following article from the Popular Science Monthly may be read with profit by every young man and many older ones:

"A business firm once employed a trained young man, whose energy and grasp of affairs soon led the management to promote him over a faithful

and trusted employe. The old clerk felt deeply hurt that the young man should be promoted over him and took occasion to complain of it to the manager.

"Feeling that this was a case that could not be argued, the manager asked the old clerk what was making all the noise in front of their building. He went forward and returned with the answer that it was a lot of wagons going by. He then asked the clerk what they were loaded with and again he went out and returned, reporting that they were loaded with wheat. The manager again sent him to ascertain how many there were, and he returned with the answer that there were sixteen. Finally he was sent to see where they were from, and he returned, saying that they were from the city of Lucena.

"The manager then asked the old clerk to be seated, and sent for the young man and said to him, 'Will you see what is the meaning of that rumbling noise in front?' The young man replied: 'It is unnecessary, for I have already ascertained that it is caused by sixteen wagons loaded with wheat. Twenty more will pass tomorrow; they belong to Romero & Co., of Lucena, and are on their way to Marchesa, where wheat is bringing \$1.25 a bushel while it costs only \$1 at Lucena. The wagons carry 100 bushels each and get 15 cents a bushel for hauling.' The young man was then dismissed, and the manager turning to the old clerk said, 'My friend, you see now why the young man was promoted over you.' This illustrates the tendency of our times, for we are rapidly advancing into an age when concentration of energy and grasp of subject in detail in the shortest possible time are requisite for advancement."

RECIPROCITY AND FLOUR. We gave a few days ago in our telegraph columns an account of the stoppage of several thousand pounds of flour at New York consigned there for Cuba, with the reason given that owing to the repeal of the reciprocity clauses of the tariff Spain had reimposed the old prohibitory duty.

We have just seen a circular issued by the Southwestern Winter Wheat Millers' Association, at Kansas City, that ought to command the serious attention of all voters.

It shows that the flour mills products are \$100,000,000 a year greater than those of iron and steel combined, yet this vast industry receives no favor at all by legislation.

Wheat ground at home places a premium upon it that the grain exporter cannot meet. It gives us at home the benefit of feedstuffs and thus becomes an important help to our live stock industries.

The American milling capacity is equal to grinding every bushel grown, and we ought to be allowed, so far as legislation is concerned to do so.

The millers of the United States are organized and will demand of congress a measure of retaliation against such countries as still refuse to remove these unjust discriminations against American flour.

This is a measure affecting directly the interest of every farmer and stock grower in the United States, and especially those of the Salt River valley, one of the greatest wheat growing sections in the Union—especially adapted in flour for shipment abroad.

They should see that their votes for congressman are only given to a man who is sound on this proposition. We have reached a point where our agricultural interests need and demand equal fostering care at the hands of the congress as iron, coal or any other form of productive industry. The men who voted to repeal the legislation that had given the markets of Cuba, Brazil and other countries to American flour should be retired—for they will never vote to restore it.

WHEN A BUSINESS man of the standing and success of Henry E. Kemp is willing to give his time and thought to the service of the people in legislative assembly no one can suspect a sinister or pecuniary motive. Henry Kemp will take his seat in the council absolutely unpledged and unhampered in his resolution to serve ably and efficiently.

AUSTRALIA'S GOLD MINES. Two Young Adventurers Who Struck a Great Bonanza in That Country.

Some big stories are current of the richness of the Coolgardie gold fields in western Australia, and particularly, says the Scientific American, of one mine in the district discovered by two young adventurers named Bailey and Ford. The former, while prospecting, found a forty-five ounce nugget sticking out from a reef in a big mountain of quartz. As quickly as possible a claim was staked out, but in spite of all precautions much valuable surface ore was stolen before a proper guard could be established.

The monthly output from the mine now amounts to 2,000 ounces. From thirty tons of ore picked from a bulk of 1,400 tons 18,000 ounces of gold were obtained, and the remainder of the stone is expected to yield from five to six ounces to the ton. Out of 650 tons raised from a depth of fifteen feet twelve tons were picked, giving 8,500 ounces of smelted gold. From another part of the mine four tons selected out of 100 tons of ore yielded 1,000 ounces of gold. Some of the other returns of picked stone were: Five tons from 250
