### PROCLAMATION —BY— THE GOVERNOR.

To All Whom It May Concern: WHEREAS, IT HAVING BEEN MADE known to me that Charles Reidt, James Lytle and Thomas Oliver were murdered at Mission Station, in the Territory of Arizona, on the 24th day of December, A. D. 1870, by PEDRO PINTO, TOMAS SANCHEZ and JESUS ORTEGA, all Mexicans by birth; and whereas, this is the third act of a similar kind that has been perpetrated near this locality within the past few years by a desperate class of men who, upon the commission of said crimes, flee to Sonora, in Mexico, for safety; and whereas, the safety of the lives and property of the Citizens of the Territory imperatively requires that these outlaws shall be brought to justice and punishment:— Now, therefore, I, A. P. K. SAFFORD, Governor of the Territory of Arizona, hereby offer a REWARD OF ONE THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$1,000 00), for the apprehension and delivery of the aforesaid Criminals to the proper judicial tribunal of the Territory, or ONE-THIRD OF SAID SUM FOR THE DELIVERY OF EITHER. ( ) Given under my hand and the Great Seal of the Territory, this 29th day of December, A. D. 1870.

### From San Diego.

We summarize from The Union of the 5th, as follows: The first daily mail from Los Angeles arrived on the 3d at noon; it would come every day at same hour. The tri-weekly to Tucson would commence the next week. It has been delayed owing to the impossibility of procuring stock. Mr. Capron had been in Los Angeles a week and only succeeded in getting 22 horses. Gen. Thomas S. Sedgwick left on the 30th ult. for Washington to represent the interests of the San Diego and Gila R. R. Co. The steamer Senator arrived the 4th with 22 passengers, besides 116 U. S. troops and two officers; troops were just 15 days from New York. Gen. Stoneman and Q. M. Gen. Tompkins, of Dept. Arizona, were expected to arrive at S. D. in a few days. Lieut. Craigie, Q. M. at Yuma, started for that post last Saturday.

OUR CAMP GRANT LETTER.—Our correspondent must be indulgent. Having published the main portion of his account of Col. Bernard's Indian clean-up, last week, a brief summary of the remainder of the letter (date Jan. 6th) must suffice. He justly compliments the officers and men—Col. B. for fully sustaining his known reputation as an Indian-fighter, and Lieuts. Robertson and Kyle for coolness and bravery. On the 2d inst., the non-commissioned officers at Grant gave a 'hop,' and the party enjoyed themselves hugely. Lieut. Garrett left for his home (Washington, D. C.) the 3d inst.

### From Arizona City.

Our correspondent, date 6th, itemizes: Castle Dome mine struck a big deposit of rich rock; much activity. Colorado river lower than for years past. Brig 'Laura' not reported—supposed lost. No news from party after murderers of Reidt—\$500 raised here by citizens. Major W. B. Hooper arrived here the 4th inst. H. W. & Co. still supplying large lots of goods to interior. Weather fine. No excitement, and everything lovely.

### Camp Thomas Items.

On Jan. 1st, our correspondent says: Mr. Samoyago arrived here with freight from Camp Goodwin Dec. 29th. Thirty-odd wagons arrived about the 27th from New Mexico, with corn for the Quartermaster at this place. Indians quiet here. The weather has at last moderated down, the snow disappearing daily. To-day (New Year's) is a lovely Sabbath.

CORRESPONDENTS will readily see why their matter appears abridged or not at all. The Legislature assembles but once in two years, and for the forty days of its session, we will surrender much of our space to the proceedings. Every man interested in public affairs in general, will be specially interested in the doings of the Legislature. We shall endeavor to find room, however, for brief items from our regular or other contributors in the meantime—after which they can 'cut loose' again. Should we conclude to issue twice-a-week (not improbable) during the session, that would alter the case entirely.

DEPUTY U. S. Surveyor, S. W. Foreman, is now engaged in extending the 2d standard South of the Gila and Salt River base to a point north of Tucson, thence a meridian south to the Sonora line. After this work, he will proceed to extend the Gila and Salt River meridian north far enough to execute surveys of lands in the valleys about Prescott, where the bulk of the appropriation will be expended.

GOOD NEWS.—The mail Thursday morning brought news of the sale of the Aribaca Ranch and Heintzelman mine to General Ripley, of London, for half a million dollars. Evidence may be seen at the Recorder's office. A substantial point is made for this section of Arizona by the sale.

YOU ARE HEREBY SUMMONED AND required to appear in an action brought against you by the above named plaintiff, in the District Court of the First Judicial District of the Territory of Arizona, and to answer the complaint therein, filed in the office of the Clerk of said Court at Tucson, in the County of Pima, within twenty days (exclusive of the day of service) after service of this summons upon you, if served within this county; if served out of this county, but within this District, thirty days; in all other cases, forty days.
