Music lovers of Tempe will be offered an opportunity next Monday evening at the normal auditorium to hear Mrs. Amalia Schmidt Gobble, the noted soprano of Davenport, Iowa, who came west for the purpose of taking part in the "Messiah" at the Arizona School of Music a few weeks ago. Mrs. Gobble is now on a trip to the northern part of the territory where she gave a recital at Williams and will also give another at Prescott. Her only public appearance before a Tempe audience was on Easter Sunday at the Congregational church. Those who then heard her will assuredly not only attend the concert Monday evening but will also induce their friends to attend. The price of admission will be but 35 cents, a much smaller admission than Mrs. Gobble customarily charges at her recitals. Of her work the Davenport Times says:

"Mrs. Amalia Schmidt Gobble sang three beautiful numbers, her high clear tones and perfect enunciation being noticeable with every note. 'Ah Love, but a Day' was followed by 'A Madrigal' and 'The Hills to Sky.' The last two songs are by Victor Harris

and enabled Mrs. Gobble to score a big hit. She responded to demands for an encore with the wonderful German love song: 'Ich Liebe Dich' and again held the audience responsive to the spell of her music."
