

**ROAD FLOODING CASE
GLENDALE DISTRICT**

Failure to Comply with the County's Impossible Demands, Gets Highly Respected Gentlemen into Court.

Through an alleged violation of the laws against the flooding of the roads by neglecting to care for waste irrigation water, W. A. Kuns, foreman of R. A. Fowler's ranch, is spending this glorious Sabbath under a weight of accusation. The heavy hand of the law was laid upon him yesterday morning, and when Mr. Fowler, who now resides in the city, heard of it he went to Glendale at once to investigate. Finding Mr. Kuns the law rather than a violator, he also put his shoulder under the weight and is helping his foreman to bear up under the white man's burden, as it is imposed in Glendale. Both gentlemen may be considered technically and for the time being as either lawbreakers or martyrs, according to the prejudices of the impartial reader. Yesterday the hearing began before Judge Flock of Glendale was continued until Tuesday by a general desire of all parties to the controversy. The county plaintiff was Road Overseer Kendrick, who desired further time to confer with the supervisors, the judge desired an opportunity to secure information of the district attorney as to his powers and duties in the premises, and Mr. Fowler, in accordance with his views, desired an opportunity to obtain counsel, if that shall be necessary after the court has passed on the facts.

Thus far there seems to be no inharmonious in any quarter concerning the statement of facts, which facts are as follows: The waste water from Mr. Fowler's ranch runs into a ditch which follows along a road some 1200 feet or more south of his ranch. For the last ten years Mr. Fowler has kept this ditch in order and continues so to do. At the end of the area in question, the ditch runs under a culvert on a country road. Through neglect, however, the leaves, twigs and other desert debris in that vicinity, together with the sediment in the water, has stopped up the culvert, and the overseer has not cleaned it for the reason that the county has provided him with no funds. Nevertheless, the water from Mr. Fowler's ranch, 1200 feet below it, has flooded the road, being unable to find an outlet under the county bridge. Now the question arises whether Mr. Fowler shall cease irrigating until the county gets money enough to fix the culvert, for fear of flooding the road, or whether he shall proceed with his farming and the county take the chance on floods until it gets the bridge fixed.

In addressing the court, yesterday, Mr. Fowler said that as president of the Water Users' association, he was most emphatically in favor of a thorough enforcement of the law and that he sought no personal favors. If it was found that his foreman had been negligent or was a violator, he would plead guilty and pay the fine and consider it a privilege to help uphold the law, but under the circumstances, he believed the shortcoming was on the part of the county and neither he nor his foreman should be held amenable, and that until he could be made to see things differently, he was disposed to take the matter to the court of last resort, if it be necessary.

He forthwith announced that in that event he would probably desire to use the complaint and his neighbors and all cognizant of the facts as witnesses for the defense, to prove that his foreman had always been diligent in the care of the waste water whenever he had half a chance to do anything, and was a good farmer and irrigator. Altogether, the cause at court was a friendly one, the neighborhood being a peaceful one and the accused and his persecutors the best of friends. It appeared that both sides to the controversy were up against the impossible in their

GOETHAL'S CONFIDENCE IN AN EARLY CANAL

He Will Tell Congress Tomorrow Just What It Will Cost.

Washington, D. C., Feb. 13--Colonel George W. Goethals, chairman of the Isthmian canal commission and member of the board of engineers appointed by President Roosevelt, who went to Panama with President-elect Taft, reached Washington today. The board will report unanimously in favor of continuing the lock plan.

Col. Goethals said: "I repeat what I said to you a year ago and that is that the canal will be completed and ships will be traversing it by the first of February, 1915. Work on the waterway is going ahead splendidly."

"I am to appear before the house committee on appropriations on Monday, when I will be prepared to give an estimate of what the canal will cost. In my judgment the character of the canal to be built has not changed in the least. The most acceptable plan is the lock canal, which is now under construction."

"Any danger of ships bumping into the gates or other parts of the locks, about which some apprehension has been expressed, will be entirely averted by electrical devices by which the vessels will be kept under control at all times."
