Appointments Announced at the Council Meeting—More Sidewalk Ordered—Slaughter House Ordinance Passed.

The first step toward the entertainment of the president of the United States by the city of Phoenix was taken last night by Mayor Lloyd Christy at the regular meeting of the city council.

After the regular business had been transacted the mayor announced the committees that are to aid in the entertainment of President Taft on his visit on October 13th. The committees were appointed at the request of Governor Richard E. Sloan. In making the announcement Mayor Christy said:

"In making the selection of those who are to take a prominent part in the reception of the president, I have endeavored to make up a list of the representative citizens of Phoenix. If President Taft should happen to have any preconceived idea that residents of this territory are wild and woolly, that it is chiefly inhabited by cowboys, Indians and Mexicans, that idea should be effectually dispelled by the personal of these committees. The only absentee at the council meeting was Mr. Campbell. The first work taken up was the ordinance describing the form of the negotiable coupon bonds which were issued to replace \$155,000 worth of city warrants which will be taken up as soon as the money is obtained from the purchasers of the bonds. Very minute instructions were received from the attorneys for Thomas J. Bolger, the chief purchaser. These details of procedure were followed with the utmost accuracy so that if any legal flaw is found in the bond issue it will not be the fault of the council.

According to instructions, the ordinance was first referred to the finance committee. The committee reported favorably. Then the rules were suspended and the ordinance read a second time. The roll was called and the rules again suspended. After more reading and more suspension of the rules the ordinance was finally declared carried.

The bonds are to be known as "Funding Bonds, '09." They are due July 1, 1924, although they may be gradually paid off in installments beginning in 1924. They are of the \$1000 denomination and bear 5 per cent interest.

The bonds are now being lithographed and a copy of the ordinance will be sent on, so that no further delay should be experienced before the city gets the money.

By petitions of more than 5 per cent of the property owners resolutions were passed ordering cement sidewalks to be built on both sides of North Fifth avenue between Bennett lane and Washington street, and on both sides of Jefferson street from Eleventh to Center street.

The slaughter house ordinance, which prescribes the district southwest of town near the river as the place for this business and prohibits the slaughtering of food animals in the corporate limits or within a mile of them, was passed unanimously.

The garbage ordinance also came up for considerable discussion and was finally passed.

The assignment of A. S. Arthur of the bill board privilege to the Elks' lodge was approved by the council at the request of Paul R. Ingles.

But one bid was received for the printing of the city charter and ordinances. The Phoenix Printing Company bid \$1.62 per page for 250 copies. Their bid was accepted.

The alleyway running back of Donofrio's store between Washington and Jefferson streets will hereafter be known as Cactus way. The request of the proprietor and sole owner of cactus candy was granted.

Mayor Christy announced that on Thursday he would start on his vacation and be away about three weeks. In the interim Claude Cisney will be acting mayor.

SOME INCIDENTS OF THE TUCSON EXCURSION

Some Hatless Elks Have Returned to Phoenix.
