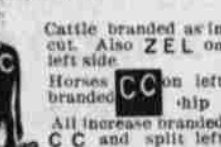

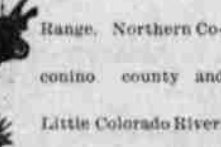

Range and Market News

Items of Interest Pertaining to the Livestock Industry of Arizona. Market Letter for the Past Week.

Kansas City Market Letter

(By J. A. Reikurt, Correspondent)

Kansas City Stock Yards, Nov. 18, 1912.

A run of 56,000 cattle came in last week, not including 7000 calves, which was 24,000 more than same in during Election week, and the same number that arrived corresponding week last year. The six leading markets were short 25,000 head, from a year ago last week, a fact that put some ginger into buyers' actions, making the 15 to 25 cents advance scored on all kinds of cattle look logical. Calves were an exception, closing 25 to 50 cents lower. The shortage in numbers of cattle marketed at the leading points does not fully express the situation as a great many light weight and low grade southern cattle were counted in at Kansas City and St. Louis. The winter beef market is starting out strong, and with evidence of considerable reserve power. Packers have not accumulated any beef this fall, and are starting in the winter beef campaign on a hand to mouth basis. Bare shelves in pork cellars add to their discomfort, which is intensified by the prospect of slim winter supplies of hogs, sheep and lambs. The run of 22,000 cattle today is selling steady to strong. Nebraska beef steers sold at 10.05 to-day, filling a post that has been vacant since September. Short fed steers bring 7.00 to 9.50, quarantine steers to-day up to 7.25, grass quarantines including southern rift-raff 4.25 to 6.25. Range cattle are fairly numerous to-day, medium killing steers at 6.40 and 6.65, good Colorado killers Friday at 7.75, heifers from Durango to-day at 6.25, range stock steers 5.25 to 6.75, feeders 5.75 to 7.00, top veals 9.75. Thanksgiving poultry is beginning to move marketwards, and will exert some adverse influence on live stock markets during the next week, though increased appetites of consumers at that season renders the poultry influence largely fictitious.

Hogs sold 5 lower today, top 7.80, bulk 7.50 to 7.75. A big run at Chicago to-day gave excuse for a ten lower opening, but the market improved all through the session, the top load selling on the final round, typical of the strong feeling in hog circles.

Sheep and lambs are on the verge of a substantial uplift, according to dealers, run 11,000 here to-day. Choice lambs are worth 7.00 to 7.50, feeding lambs lacking in quality, selling around 6.00.

WHAT SOUTHERN CATTLEMEN ARE DOING

Estimating conservatively, cattlemen of Gila county received over three million dollars for their stock for the ten months ending October 31, 1912.

The cattle business, though not so great a source of revenue to Gila county as mining, is nevertheless a large and rapidly growing business. What is true here, is, of course, also true of other large portions of Arizona. Cattlemen say that the Alkali State cannot be excelled for breeding purposes. This is due to the mild winters, early spring and wide ranges. No serious storms visit the country. Cross country travel for both man and beast is easy. In short, this is an ideal cattle breeding section.

There are many cattle raisers in this county and more are constantly coming in. It is probable that within five years, considering the increased demand and high prices paid for cattle, that Gila county will double the present number of cattlemen operating on its ranges.

Of the cattle raised in Gila county, most of them that are shipped, go over the Arizona Eastern Railway, but large numbers from the northern part of the county, from the Payson, Pine and Pleasant Valley country, are driven to Flagstaff and Phoenix.

Cattle are scarcer now in proportion to the population of the United States than they have been in twenty years and the prices paid are higher than ever before during that time. Arizona cattle are now selling for six cents on the hoof and stockmen say that by spring they will be six and a half and seven cents. Considering the fact that the average Arizona range fed steer weighs about 800 pounds they will sell about \$56 a head in the spring.

The shipping points on the Arizona Eastern where the cattle loading pens are located are Cutter, Bylas, Geronimo, Ft. Thomas, Solomonville and Safford. Gila county cattle are usually loaded on cars at Cutter and Bylas.

The following figures from the books of the railway, showing cattle shipments during the ten months ending October 31st indicate clearly how large the cattle business in this section is:

Shipped to Bowie during the ten months mentioned, 32,010 head.

Shipments by the month: April, 150 cars, 5395 head; May, 255 cars, 10,644 head; June, 263 cars, 10,791 head; August, 7 cars, 259 head; September, 80 cars, 2,918 head; October, 60 cars, 2003 head. Total number of cars, 815; total head, 32,010. During the months of January, February, March and July none was shipped. Of this number, 642 cars, containing 24,942 cattle, were from Gila county. Figuring 24,942 head at \$41, which is a low estimate at the prevailing prices, it makes a total of \$1,022,622 as the value of cattle shipped out by county.

To these figures must be added the number of cattle consumed within the border of the county. At a low estimate, it averages about 600 head a week. At \$41 a head the total is \$984,000.

In addition to this must be considered the cattle from the county driven north and west, upon which no figures can be secured. Calves are not taken into consideration in any of the figures mentioned.

Mr. Max Bonne, the veteran cattleman, speaking of conditions in Gila county, said yesterday:

"Conditions for breeding purposes cannot be excelled. This is because of the mild winters, big ranges, early springs and the absence of serious storms."

"This year the cattle market is better than it has been for twenty years. Cattle are being sold now for five and a half and six cents on the hoof and in the spring they will be as high as six and a half and seven."

Mr. William Sparks, formerly cattle inspector, when asked relative to the cattle in the northern end of the county, upon which no figures can be secured, said:

"Lots of cattle in the northern part of the county for shipping are driven to Flagstaff, but most of the cattle they turn off are driven to Phoenix, fattened on alfalfa and sold to the local butchers. What they do not consume are shipped. I am speaking now of the Payson, Pine and Pleasant Valley country. Cattle that are raised south of Kline on the Tonto are driven to the city."

Mr. Will Shanley, speaking of prices, said:

"Yes, cattle are selling now in Phoenix and other points at six and six and half cents and by spring they will sell as high as seven cents. This is on the hoof. The high prices, in my opinion, are due to the fact that the population of this country is growing faster than the cattle business."

William A. Parks, who has been a cattle raiser in this section for many years, said:

"There is a heavier demand for cattle this year than I have seen for many years and there is no prospect that the prices will drop for it looks as if the demand would be greater than the available supply for some time to come. As long as that situation exists, prices will remain firm."
