The new catalogue for 1914-1915 is out. To the many courses already offered in the N. A. N. S. a new four year's Commercial course has been added. This will prove a very valuable addition. Notice to County Candidates

The attention of candidates for county and precinct offices is called to the provision of Section 3036 of the Revised Statutes of the State of Arizona, 1913, with reference to the limit of expenditures of candidates for primary election.

Candidates for County Offices, including Superior Judge, State Senator and Representatives, are limited to an expenditure of two hundred dollars as campaign expenses for the primary election. Candidates for

PRECINCT OFFICES

are limited to an expenditure of fifty dollars as campaign expenses for the primary election.

All moneys expended by candidates for campaign expenses from July 10th to date of primaries constitute the campaign expenses for said primary election.

Itemized statements of expenditures during such campaign must be filed by candidates after the primary election with the clerk of the Board of Supervisors.
