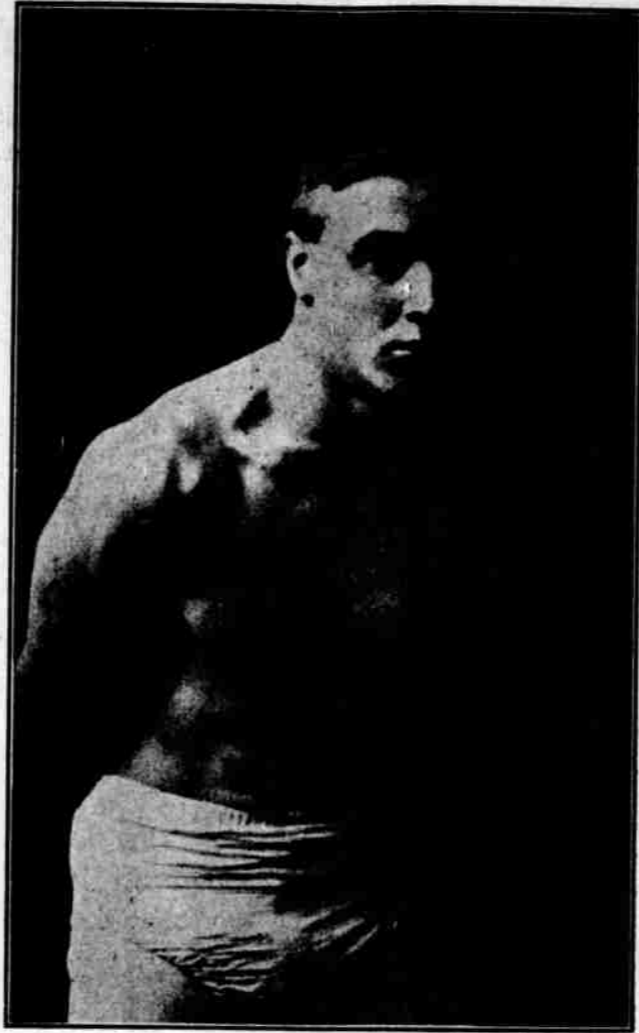

**Burns Detectives Hunt for Bank Robbers**

Duncan, Sept. 23.—Detectives from the Wm. J. Burns international detective agency, the official detective agency for the American Bankers Association, have joined in the hunt for the robbers who held up and robbed the bank of Duncan of nearly \$4000 Tuesday afternoon, Sept. 15. The detectives are leaving nothing undone and are running down every clue it is possible to get, regardless of whether it be great or small, and in doing so are using both horses and high-powered autos, covering mountain ranges as well as desert and prairie. The work is under the supervision of G. A. Horn, assistant manager of the agency's Los Angeles office. Mr. Horn has been with the agency for many years and has worked on many prominent cases and often proved his ability as a secret service officer and is well known throughout the country. Mr. Horn expresses his belief that the robbers will be apprehended very soon.—Clifton Mining Journal.
